B. That part of the former Village of Stouffville lying east of the C.N.R. right-of-way may use a hose for watering lawns, Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday between the hours of 8 A.M. to 9 A.M. and 7 P.M. to 8 P.M. ONLY

Area being wrecked - councillor

Large crowds of teenagers are wrecking havoc in the Whitchurch-Stouffville conservation area, on Aurora Rd., according to councillor Jim Doble.

Mr. Doble asked council to write a letter to the South Lake Simcoe Conservation Authority, which manages the

property, so that something can be done.

Apparently large groups of teenagers have been using the area for overnight camping, which is not allowed, and there is garbage everywhere. Vandalism is also high, and Mr.

Doble says that shelters and picnic tables are regularly chopped up and used for firewood.

"A lot of local people who used the area in the past, are now afraid to go in there," said Mr. Doble. He explained that the area is totally un-

supervised and said that the best solution would be if the entrance road were ploughed up so no cars could get in. He also felt this would solve the problem of drag racing. "They have a line on the road saying start, and about a quarter mile

down there's another one that says stop. They're dragging on the road all night and camping there all weekend," charged Mr. Doble.

The conservation authority later wrote council and explained that the authority will be making changes to improve the situation.

CFRB man dies in crash

Investigation continues into an accident at Gormley which took the life of CFRB radio technician Walter Richard Salway of R. R. 1 Queensville, early Friday morning.

York Regional Police, 19 Division, said Mr. Salway, 52, was

southbound in a double lane section of Woodbine Avenue south of the Gormley Road, with another car beside him in the outside lane.

Where the lanes covered into one, Mr. Salway's car, a small Honda, swerved across the northbound lane into the path of a northbound

tanker truck driven by Kenneth Sheldon of Sunderland, and rolled into the east ditch. Mr. Salway was pronounced dead on arrival at York Central Hospital.

Police are searching for the driver of the second southbound car who left the scene.
