The early 50's proved to be a very successful time for Stouffville sports, as along with the Clippers, the girls softball team took the Markham



Township championship.

But Stouffville's sporting success does not start or end in that decade, as there have been numerous winners throughout the town's 100 years.


However, mention should not be made only of the winners, but to all the athletes, win or lose, that have given the town the pride and pleasure of seeing them perform.
