### Region approves industrial park

NEWMARKET — A proposal to turn a 30-acre Vandorf sod farm into an industrial park for light industry has received regional approval. The site, owned by Richmond Sod Landscape Contractors Ltd., is located to the north of Station Road east of Woodbine Avenue. The proposal was approved on the condition

that development be restricted to industry that does not need water supply or sewage treatment facilities beyond those required for employee use.

Because the development lies directly north of a Holland River headwater stream, the area is susceptible to pollution from septic tank effluent.

### 20 mile ride for C.A.R.D.

### Family history course offered

AURORA — A night school course teaching how to trace family history is just one of the new courses being offered by the York County Board of Education this year.

The family history class, called Climbing Your Family Tree, is being offered at the Markham District High School.

It is just one of the 84 courses set up by the Board, ranging from belly dancing to how to live naturally.

Regular academic courses, which can provide credits towards secondary school diplomas, as well as art, crafts and cooking classes are being set up.

Other new classes include one course aimed at improving family communications, at the Bayview Secondary School in Richmond Hill.

Teaching skills for overland and overwater trips, living naturally through yoga and how to entertain economically are other new courses. Registration will be held Sept. 19 and Sept. 21, from 7 to 9 p.m. at 10 schools, with fees ranging from \$10 to \$24, depending on the length of the course. At least 15 people must enroll in each class before it will be held.

Schools who have the classes are Bayview, and Don Head in Richmond Hill, Dr. G.W. Williams, Aurora, Huron Heights, Newmarket, King City, Markham, Stouffville, Thornhill, Sutton and Woodbridge.

## Stouffville youth charged with theft

Last month Two-Way Communications Systems, 9185 Yonge St., Thornhill, discovered a large number of CB radios and equipment were missing from stock, and had been sold by an employee who allegedly pocketed the cash. The accused person left their employ July 28, and it was not until August that the loss, estimated at \$3,500, was discovered.

Phillip Carl Ryckman, 19, 98 10th Line N., Stouffville, has been charged with theft over \$200, and will appear at court September 13.

Two small Markham area boys, 11 and 6, who took off to see the world last Wednesday morning were foot sore and weary by 6 p.m. and made off with a ride on

lawnmower to ease their journey.

At 6:15 p.m. August 31, Wm. Kedwell of 16th Avenue, Buttonville, reported the theft of his lawnmower to York Regional Police, who apprehended the pair. Police said the two culprits who were the subject of a day-long hunt had left home at 9 a.m. grew tired as the day wore on, and the older boy commandeered the mower.

The children were returned to their parents, but the 11-year-old has been charged with theft over \$200, and will appear at Juvenile Court September 19.

Wanted A warrant has been issued for an unidentified man, after two Markham business men were

threatened and their vehicles damaged.

Police said that at 1 a.m. September 1, John Lazarou, 2 Robinson St., Markham received a phone call from a man who threatened his life. His vehicle was also mentioned, and when Mr. Lazarou went to investigate he found the gas tank had been torn open. A vehicle owned by Peter Psapotis, Sherwood Park Tavern, Markham, was also damaged.

Police investigated, and a warrant was issued

for the suspect who could not be located.

Brother Summonsed. Edwin Smalley, 143 Main Street, Stouffville, was injured during an argument with his brother, at the Wellington Place Tavern, Markham, August 30, and as a result the brother has been summonsed for assault causing bodily harm.

Police said the argument began at 11 p.m. when Mr. Smalley's brother entered the tavern. Mr. Smalley walked out, and the ac-

cused allegedly followed.

The assault took place on the parking lot, and Mr. Smalley was taken to hospital with two fractured bones in his face.

Ronald Smalley, 30, of Gravenhurst has been charged with assault causing bodily harm. Theft from garage Grant Egan, 82 Liebeck Cr., Unionville, reported that during July his garage was entered, and camping gear, tools and lawn chairs were removed. Value was set at \$943.

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
