STOUFFVILLE - Town council met recently in special session to consider restructuring the local hydro to include all of Whitechurch - Stouffville, but failed to come to any conclusions.

Restructuring of the public utilities was to have come with regional government back in 1971. Stouffville Public Utilities, which now only serves the former village of Stouffville, would be expanded to provide service for all of Whitechurch - Stouffville.

That part of the municipality is now looked after directly by Ontario Hydro and the town would have to purchase the transformers and lines at an estimated cost of two million dollars.

Council has been asked to comment on the Electrical Utility Restructuring Report, a study completed by officials of the local utility companies. Stouffville hydro Secretary Gerald Pegg was a member of the committee.

According to the report restructuring would increase hydro costs to Stouffville customers. The present cost for hydro is 2.588 cents per Kwh (Kilowatt hour) and with restructuring would cost 2.946 cents per Kwh.

There has been some talk of Whitechurch - Stouffville amalgamating with Markham and this

would result in a cost of 2,180 cents per Kwh. at 1978 rates. Markham now pays 2.568 cents per Kwh. and if they expanded to serve their own municipal boundaries, the rate would be 2.788 cents.

Mayor Gordon Ratcliff said he is not in favour of going together with Markham as the town would be in a minority position on the utility commission and would lose local control. He is, however, for expanding the local utility to include all of Whitechurch - Stouffville, if provincial grants are made available to cover the capital costs.

"The cost of the plant and hydro lines are quite heavy and should be subsidized by the provincial government," he said, adding, "I am not in favour if there is no subsidy."

The mayor, stressing he was speaking for himself and not for council, said, "Its six years late now. It should be pursued vigorously."

Mr. Ratcliff feels that better service will be the result of reconstruction. "The smaller the utility the better the service."

The mayor said there has been some trouble getting Ontario Hydro crews out to repair storm damage in the rural parts of the municipality.

Mr. Ratcliff hopes to get council to come to a decision on the matter before the Sept. 13 regular meeting of

council. Council's remarks would be forwarded with the report, which was completed in July, to the provincial government. The local PUC has no debt and because of this the mayor feels the asking price of two million dollars is too high.

Mr. Ratcliff said he has spoken to other members of York Regional Council and they are in agreement that the plant costs are too high.

"It is a major shift restructuring and the province states that they are going to do it," stated the mayor. Apparently Richmond Hill, Newmarket and Markham are all in favour of expanding the utilities to the regional boundaries.

The report recommended that King and Georgina stay with Ontario Hydro but there is some talk the two municipalities may get together to form a utility commission.
