

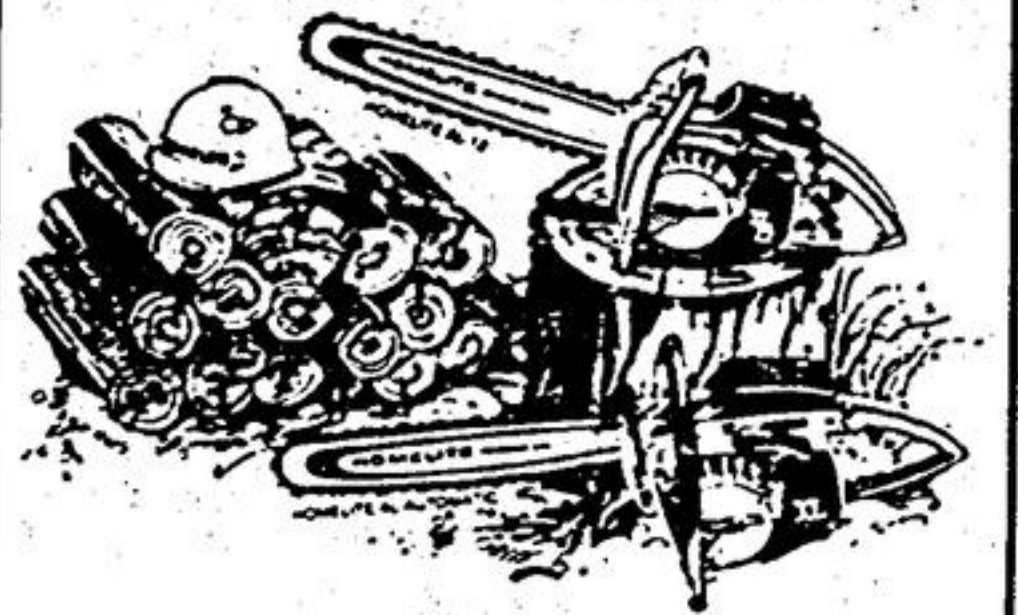

## Police chase Markham man

## Radio applications to be heard

NEWMARKET — Television and Telecommunications Commission hearing in Ottawa beginning Nov. 15.

Application for a Newmarket-Aurora radio station will be heard at a Canadian Radio-

Brad Walker Ford Mercury Sales Ltd., 567 Davis Dr. Under CRTC regulations, the application must be made available during business hours to anyone wishing to inspect it. Closing date for letters of support or objection must be received by the CRTC by Oct. 26.

The proposal for a station, to operate on the AM band as 1380 CKAN, has been made by a group of area businessmen including Mayor Bob Forhan, Regional Councillor Ray Twiney, and Barrie resident Ralph Snelgrove, who founded Barrie radio station CKBB.

Suggested programming includes:

- Local news weather and sports, twice-daily area farm reports, a daily phone-in opinion show, Mayor's report and community service announcements, local funeral announcements, games and quizzes, and a local news review Sunday evenings.

Broadcasting will take place in English only, and will run from 5 a.m. until midnight.

Musical selections will be "middle of the road", and will comprise about 39 per cent of programming. The application indicates a library of 15,000 musical titles, to be interrupted no more than 10 times per hour by a total of no more than 15 minutes of commercial advertising.

Programming breakdown has been suggested as follows: news, 13.5 per cent; community service, 4; backgrounding, 8; sports, 4; human interest shows, 20; music, 39; production, 2.7; and advertising, 16.

Although a press release issued last week said that a studio location has not been decided, the application lists 27 Main St. as the studio site. It also indicates that the 2,500-square-foot site will be remodelled at a cost of \$25,000 and leased for an annual fee of \$12,500.

The proposed staff of 21 includes four administrators, one technician, 12

programming people and four salesmen. Tony Drew, a local freelance reporter, is listed as a possible news source.

Beamed from a transmitter in Oak Ridges, the station is designed to reach an area including Newmarket, Aurora, Bradford, and Whitchurch-Stouffville.

Set-up of the station is estimated at \$306,800, which includes renovation and equipping of the studio and construction of a transmitting building.

Operating costs for the first year are estimated at \$382,400, including rent, salaries, promotion and operating costs. Gross revenue for the same year, from both national and local advertising, is estimated at \$342,000.

The \$410,000 for the project has been raised by a group of 11 businessmen through the issue of 30,000 preferred and 10,000 common shares, worth \$10,000; a bank loan for \$100,000; and a third loan of \$300,000.

## Application is available for new radio station

NEWMARKET — Under CRTC regulations, applications for radio licences must be made available to the public 50 days before hearings are held.

In the case of Newmarket's application, the application is available at Brad Walker Ford Mercury Sales Ltd., 567 Davis Dr. The complete application may be viewed by anyone wishing to inspect it during regular business hours.

Letters of support or objection must describe the interest of the intervenor, a statement of relevant facts, and in-

clude the name, address, telephone number and signature of the intervenor. A copy of the intervention must be served on the applicant, Brad Walker.

The application will be heard in Ottawa at a hearing beginning Nov. 15. Letters commenting on the application must be received by the CRTC

by Oct. 26, through registered mail or by personal delivery.
