## High minimum wage hurts competitiveness of small businesses

Traditionally small businessmen have been Canada's main employers yet today they are under heavier pressure than any other business group.

Tax concessions help, but other steps are needed. Many smaller businessmen never reach a taxable earnings level before they are snuffed out. It is here that aid is needed. Less regulation by government would be a tonic for such entrepreneurs. Dealing with such regulations is but an added cost for big business. It kills the small fellow.

Consideration should be given to assisting smaller firms in the formation of consortia which would enable them to better compete with larger firms. Grouping smaller concerns, each with their speciality, would preserve their individual identities, while allowing them to bid for large orders both domestically and internationally.

More subcontracting by large concerns to smaller businessmen would revitalize our economy.

Government which is the largest purchaser of goods must ensure that small businessmen get a fair share of the orders.

Federal and provincial minimum wage laws have contributed to our lack of competitiveness in that Canadian minimum wages are now 20-30 percent higher than in the United States.

Our relatively high minimum wages have also contributed to our unemployment.

The federal minimum wage of \$2.85 an hour compares to a U.S. minimum wage of \$2.30. The American Congress recently boosted their minimum wage to \$2.65 an hour effective next January and to \$2.85 a year later and to \$3.05 in 1980.

It would be wise for federal and provincial authorities to freeze any further increases in our minimum wages until the Americans at least catch up. In certain fields such as the tourist industry it may be necessary to make further minimum wage exemptions to regain competitiveness.

As minimum wage laws are a major cause of youth unemployment, we should consider a short run subsidy - say, a six month subsidy - to first time job youths who are employed in the private sector, and who otherwise would be unemployed if full minimum wages had to be paid.

Our export financing which is in the billions has become the private preserve of a few concerns. It must be made available to all exporters both small and large.

We have lost our balance in Canada between big corporations and those not so big. It must be regained so that the traditional ingenuity, inventiveness and entrepreneurship of small businessmen can once again contribute to our growing wealth.
