



We are facing another possible postal strike. Here is a plan that will help to put the CUPW in their proper place.



V.A.P.S

(Volunteer Alternative to the Postal Strike): Basically this is a very simple plan. Central mail depots to be organized in major cities and for smaller areas. Volunteers will organize, manage and sort the mail. Volunteers will drive mail to delivery points. Arrangements will be made for air shipments of mail across the country. All volunteers will be supplied with names of other volunteers in their areas.

If we all work together, this plan will work. One more thing: Why don't you write to your M.P. requesting the necessary legislation to make post office and other monopolistic unions strikes illegal?
