

Medal winner Judy Sackfield

Track star aims for Olympics

STOUFFVILLE — "I thought I could beat her and I did," said Judy Sackfield, matter-of-factly when she was asked about her gold-medal victory in the high jump at the legions sponsored Ontario Summer Games recently.

Bob Meldrum, her coach, seems to share her ambition. "He's looking forward to 1980," says Judy mischievously, but her green eyes looked serious as she talked about qualifying for the next Olympics. Only four inches separate her from eligibility in the world event. The highest Judy has jumped is five feet eight inches, but she'll have to up that to six feet, the minimum qualifying height. However, chances are that Judy would not go for the high jump but the pentathlon. "It's more challenging," said Judy.

The pentathlon takes in the high jump, long jump, 100 meter hurdles, shot put, and 800 meter race. Although Judy won the gold medal in the high jump, the long jump, in which she won a bronze, is really her event — she entered the former merely as an afterthought. "Since I was going down anyway, I thought I might as well be in it," she remarked. In the past she has also done well in the 400 meters, the hurdles shot put and discus, and she is looking forward to refining her skills in these events. Judy also did very well in the high school track and field meet last year, but was sidelined in the midst of competition when she twisted her ankle. Immediately after recovering from that mishap, she sustained a hairline fracture in her leg. "I was out all summer," said Judy matter-of-factly. However, she's back in full training now, more determined than ever, after losing all that valuable practice time to steam ahead. "I'm not going to stop," said Judy, and her serious face made it plain that others would find it hard to stop her as well.

Tractor safety rodeo at Markham Fair

There's a lot of new activities slated for the new look Markham Fair, and just one of them is the tractor safety rodeo. The rodeo, sponsored by the York County junior farmers and the Ontario farm safety association, takes place on Sunday, October 2 at 12 noon on the south-east side of the racetrack. It is a competition involving the safe use of tractor and farm equipment. It is open to anyone aged 16 to 30 and prizes will be given to those that handle the equipment the safest. According to Pete Hulshof, committee member of the junior farmers, there will be four events each contestant must do. The first is a short quiz on safety practices, followed by a tractor and wagon driving exercise involving an obstacle course. In the third event the contestant must stack skids in a front end loader and the final exercise is to mount a three-point hitch, something Mr. Hulshof predicted would cause a lot of problems to many of the people trying their skills. Anyone interested in taking part, just be at the rodeo area before noon and sign up. Be there early as there are a limited number of spots available. Final judging will be done by farm safety personnel, and a first place trophy and consolation prizes will be awarded.
