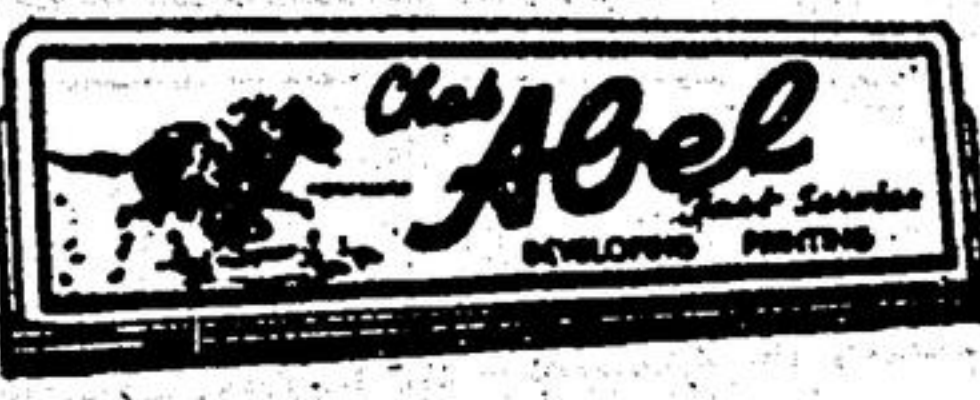
Morning group
