Miss United Way

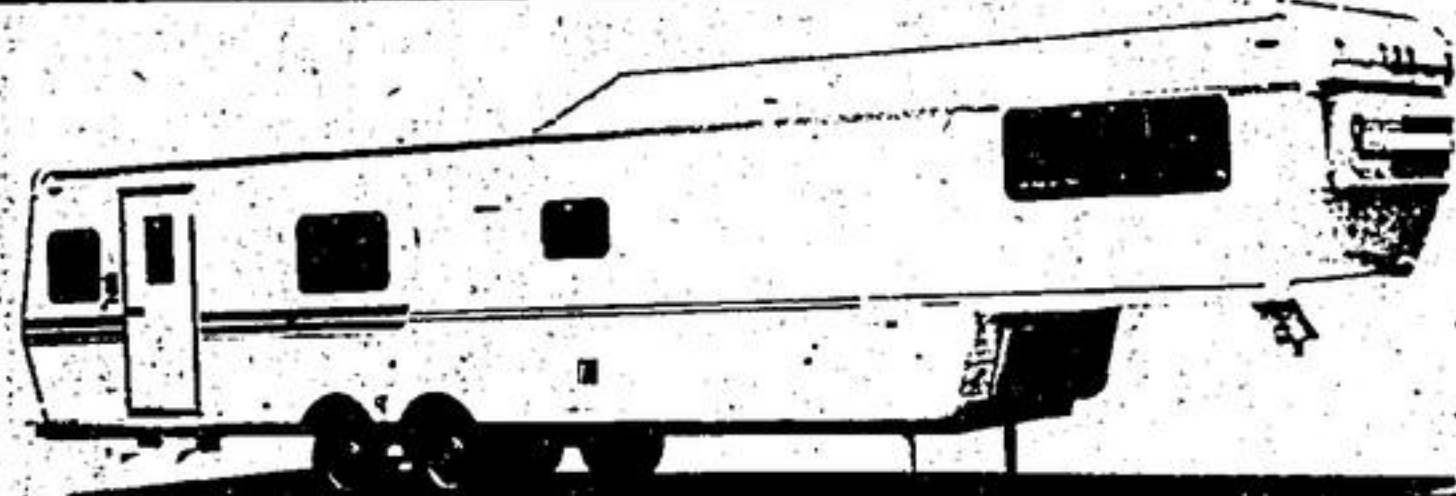

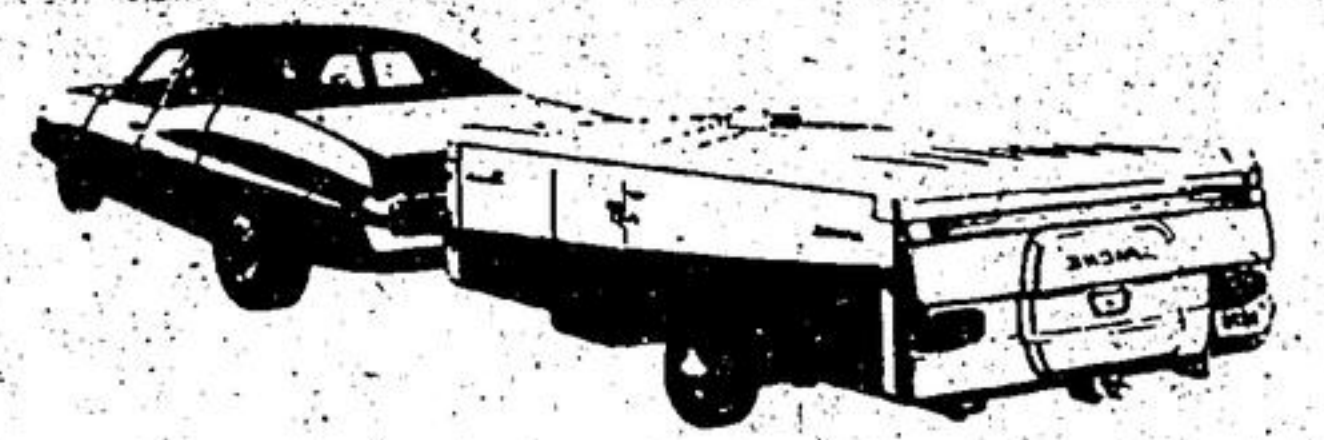

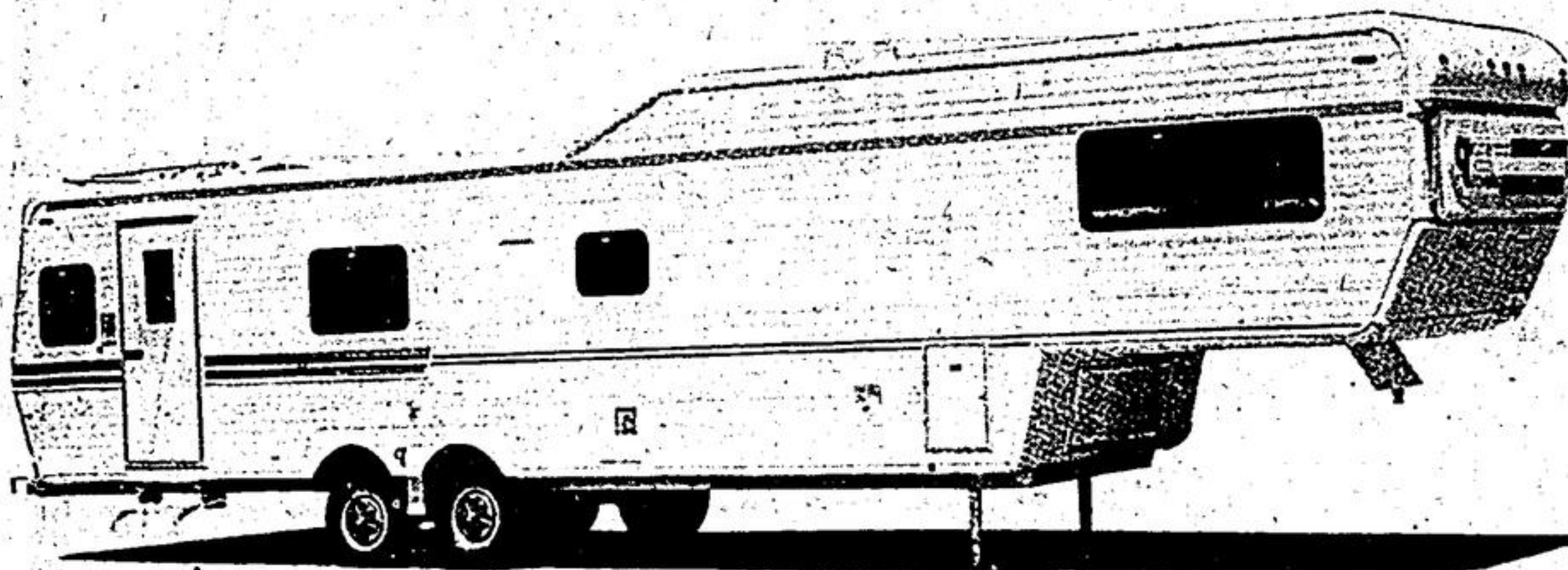
