NOTICE OF APPLICATION to the Ontario Municipal Board by The Corporation of the Town of Pickering for approval of a By-law to regulate land use passed pursuant to Section 35 of The Planning Act.

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Pickering intends to apply to The Ontario Municipal Board pursuant to the provisions of Section 35 of The Planning Act for approval of By-law 711/77 passed on the 3rd day of October, 1977. A note giving an explanation of the purpose and effect of the bylaw and stating the lands affected thereby is also furnished herewith.

ANY PERSON INTERESTED MAY, within twenty-one (21) days after the date of this notice, send by registered mail or deliver to the clerk of the Town of Pickering notice of his support or objection of approval of the said by-law together with a request for notice of any hearing that may be held giving also the name and address to which such notice should be given.

THE ONTARIO MUNICIPAL BOARD may approve of the said by-law but before doing so it may appoint a time and place when any objection to the by-law will be considered. Notice of any hearing that may be held will be given only to persons who have filed an objection or notice of support and who have left with or delivered to the clerk undersigned, the address to which notice of hearing is to be sent. A copy of By-law 711/77 may be examined at the office of the clerk during business hours.

THE LAST DAY FOR FILING OBJECTIONS will be the 1st day of December
