NOTICE OF APPLICATION to the Ontario Municipal Board by The Corporation of the Town of Pickering for approval of a By-law to regulate land use passed pursuant to Section 35 of The Planning Act.

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Pickering intends to apply to The Ontario Municipal Board pursuant to the provisions of Section 35 of The Planning Act for approval of By-law 711/77 passed on the 3rd day of October, 1977. A note giving an explanation of the purpose and effect of the by-law and stating the lands affected thereby is also furnished herewith.

ANY PERSON INTERESTED MAY, within twenty-one (21) days after the date of this notice, send by registered mail or deliver to the clerk of the Town of Pickering notice of his support or objection of approval of the said by-law together with a request for notice of any hearing that may be held giving also the name and address to which such notice should be given.

THE ONTARIO MUNICIPAL BOARD may approve of the said by-law but before doing so it may appoint a time and place when any objection to the by-law will be considered. Notice of any hearing that may be held will be given only to persons who have filed an objection or notice of support and who have left with or delivered to the clerk undersigned, the address to which notice of hearing is to be sent. A copy of By-law 711/77 may be examined at the office of the clerk during business hours.

THE LAST DAY FOR FILING OBJECTIONS will be the 1st day of December 1977.

## Young mother two children die in crash

RICHMOND HILL — A young mother and two children were killed Monday when their car went out of control on Bayview Ave. and collided head on with a truck.  
Witnesses alleged that a second northbound car which passed Mrs. Parente prior to the accident may have caused her to lose control.  
Police arrested a Scarborough man Monday night and Tuesday morning Dominico Minniti, 37, of Brooklawn Dr., Scarborough appeared at Richmond Hill provincial court charged with criminal negligence causing death and failing to remain at the scene of an accident.  
Deputy Chief Robert Hood of York Regional Police said that Carla

Parente, 27, Tavio, 3, and Nadia, two months, of 112 Neighbourly Lane, Richmond Hill, were northbound on Bayview, north of Highway 7, when Mrs. Parente lost control and swerved into the southbound lane, colliding with a truck.  
The truck was driven by Wilber Warren, 54, of Toronto. The two children were pronounced dead at York Central Hospital. Mrs. Parente was transferred to Sunnybrook Medical Centre where she died a short time later.  
Mr. Warren was not seriously injured.  
Mr. Minniti was released on \$4,000 bail with one or more securities without deposit.

## Applies to build store in west end

STOUFFVILLE — Card's Hardware may expand and move from the centre to the west end of town, planning board learned last week.

Graydon Card had approached planning board several times before with various proposals. The latest had been an apartment complex and shopping plaza, which was not approved by the board.

Planning Board Chairman Eldred King voiced concern about splitting up a parcel of land that was so important to the community and wondered what would happen to Card's store in town. Mr. Card said that if his new location was approved he would sell his old store, but this worried Mayor Gord Ratcliff. "Do the businessmen in town

want more stores?" he asked, "there seems to already be some question about the East End Plaza."  
Planning board has deferred a decision for two weeks.

## Students sell Texas fruit

The SDSS student body is out in full force taking orders for the Texas grown Ruby Red

grapefruits and Rio Grand oranges.  
The sale of the Texas oranges and grapefruit is

being conducted by the student council under the leadership of Sally Courage, and replaces the sale of chocolate bars and almonds as SDSS's main fund raising event. Miss Courage says that the profits from this sale will be used to finance all the clubs and organizations within the school this year.  
The fruit is grown in the very southern tip of Texas in the Rio Grande Valley and arrives in Stouffville for delivery in home approximately four days after it is picked.

Either type of fruit may be purchased in 20 lb. or 40 lb. packages. The smaller package costs \$5.75 while the 40 pounder is \$9.75. The student canvassers will ask for pre-payment of each order, mainly to make the delivery easier. Delivery is expected approximately on December 12th or 13th so the fruit will still be fresh for the Christmas season.

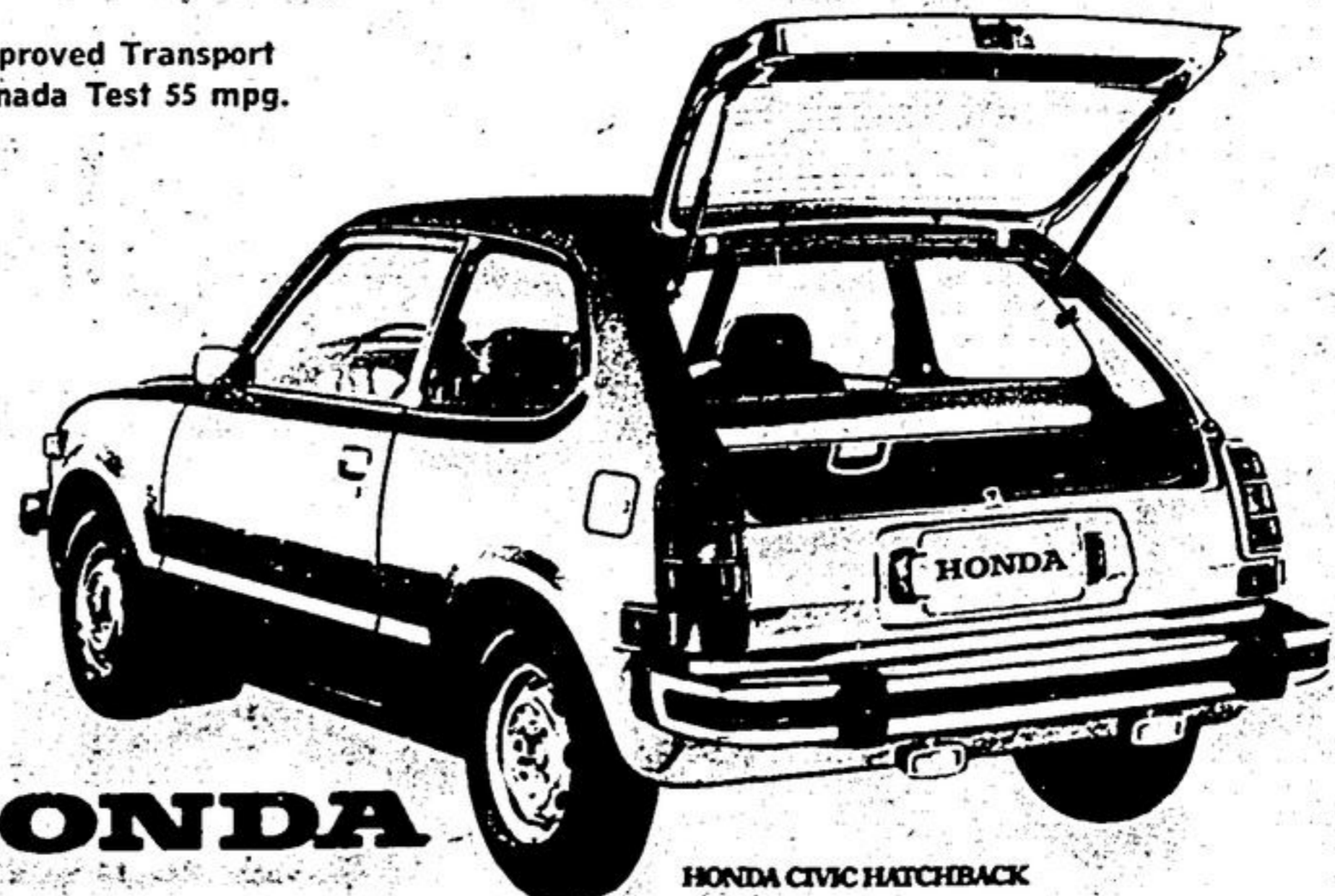
