Stouffville Clippers crush Port Hope

The Stouffville Clippers have proved themselves to be the dominant power in their league last week, following their 21-2 thrashing of Port Hope.

The Clippers, undefeated with an 8-0 record, were led by the incredible performance of Perry Brown, who

tallied four goals and seven assists. Steve Kirkland also put in an outstanding game, picking up four goals.

The Clippers started and ended strong, and the scoring was rapid fire. Things got underway at 1:05 of the first on Steve Kirkland's goal, from Andy Leitch and

Brad Leitch. Twenty-six seconds later Steve Kirkland had his second goal, Andy Leitch assisting.

Mike Whelan's first goal of the year and his first of three for the night came from Perry Brown and Steve Kirkland. Before anyone could catch their breath, 20

seconds to be exact, Brad Leitch made it 4-0, assisted by Mike Whelan and Perry Brown. Andy Leitch from Brad Leitch and Howie Jones made it 5-0 and then Howie Jones first of his three goals only 17 seconds later put it at 6-0. Port Hope's only goal of the first, by Rick

Stevenson closed out the period.

The Clippers by no means rested on their comfortable lead in the second period. Turning the game into a rout, Tim Quinn scored 15 seconds into the period, assisted by Perry Brown and Geoff Roy. Perry Brown then got into the act with

a goal from Tim Quinn and Steve Kirkland. Steve Schell from Perry Brown then made the score 9-1. The second period mercifully ended for Port Hope following Geoff Roy's score from Tim Quinn and Mike Whelan's tally from Tim Quinn and Perry Brown. With the score 11-1 a lot of people figured most of the scoring was finished.

Port Hope broke up the Clippers, string of goals with a tally of their own, Chris Bullen beating goalie Rick Marshman.

Perry Brown's second goal from Mike Whelan and Tim Quinn, and then Steve Kirkland's fourth of the night made it look more like a football score, 17-2.

Things weren't over yet as Perry Brown put in his third, unassisted, and Bill Meakes got an unassisted goal, making it 19-2.

The scoring finally came to a halt after Mike Whelan and Perry Brown closed bombardment.

The win over Barrie made up for two previous losses at the Laurentian University tourney in Sudbury and the Referees tourney in Orillia. Barrie went on to win both meets.

Barrie also defeated the Spartans in the first two games of the round robin tournament in Woodbridge but in the finals the two teams played what was described by officials as the highest calibre of volleyball they had seen in the GBSSA.
