Eddie Luther will be airborne once again next year when he moves into a new job with CKEY radio station. Eddie will report on Toronto traffic from the air on a part-time basis, about 75 days a year. Eddie told The Tribune this is only the third job he has ever had.

Eddie Luther moves to new radio station

Eddie Luther, Stouffville's pioneer airborne traffic reporter, will become a member of the CKEY staff early in 1978. He joins the current CKEY pilot-announcer staff of Bob Rice and Dianne Pepper, to give CKEY by far the most experienced traffic team in Metro. Dini Petty fills out the team on a freelance basis.
Several years ago, Eddie began helicopter traffic reporting with CFRB and moved to CH-FI-CFTR in the late sixties. He is licensed to fly both fixed and rotary wing aircraft. After a brief period of familiarization, he'll be able to fly CKEY's twin-engine Skymaster as well as the Hughes helicopter.
In addition to his traffic reporting assignments, Eddie will also act as a 'swing' announcer for vacationing CKEY music personalities. It'll be just once in a while.
Last summer Eddie had stopped traffic reporting for CHFI-CFTR and had gone back to news announcing, his original radio job. In addition he did a music show and a short travel program.
He told The Tribune his new job will give him a great deal of variety as he will be flying about 75 days a year and the rest of his time will be spent in the studio filling in on other disc jockey's programs.

THE ASSESSMENT ACT
NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS AND TENANTS
As a result of a delay in the passage of recent amendments to the Assessment Act, the normal return of the assessment rolls in municipalities and localities in Ontario will be delayed.
The Honourable Margaret Scrivener, Minister of Revenue, has therefore extended to January 19, 1978, the date upon which the annual assessment roll is returned in all municipalities and localities in Ontario, EXCEPT those municipalities located in The Regional Municipality of Waterloo where the day upon which the assessment roll is returned will be extended to March 16, 1978.
This extension affects the time period during which owners and tenants may appeal their assessments. As a result, the final date for lodging a complaint with the Assessment Review Court in respect of any assessment contained in the assessment rolls is extended from January 19, 1978 to February 9, 1978. In The Regional Municipality of Waterloo the date for lodging a complaint has been extended to April 7, 1978.
