Supervisor wouldn't leave man stranded

Markham area road supervisor Morley Timbers said there is "no way" he would leave a motorist stranded in the snow.

Mr. Timbers was responding to a story in last week's Tribune which reported that a resident whose car was stuck on the 10th line was left to fend for himself by the Markham road department. It further stated that after the resident had helped the supervisor free his own stuck vehicle, after which the works employee just drove off.

"Mr. Timbers told The Tribune that after locating the stuck vehicle

he told the man he would go and get the snowplow for help.

"The man's car was almost buried in the snow and I didn't think I could get his car out with my half ton pick up truck. So I told him I'd go get the plow to pull him out," he said.

According to Mr. Timbers, the plow was located and directed back to the motorist. He also commented that his truck was not really stuck.

"I just had to back it up a bit and then I was free. I didn't see the man behind the truck so I really don't know if he helped me or not."

He said he also found

out later that the motorist was gone by the time the plow had reached him.
