Their defensive strength is shown by their record in the last 10 games. The Peeewe have allowed just 10 goals during that span, and have lost just one game in the last 12 matches.

match was led by the three goal effort of Mike Anderson. Rob Boudreau, twice and Luigi Tesoro assisted on Mike's goals.

Shane Rutherford, a player the Peeewe had just called up from the house league also played a prominent role in the game. Shane scored twice for the team and he may stay with the B's if things work out. His first goal was unassisted, the second assisted by Chris Miller.

Don Wagg, both defencemen, also pocketed one goal each, on fine offensive rushes.

The team now has a bit of a breather until the new year, when they take on the top teams six times in the month of January. Their first games are January 6 against Bay Ridges, and January 7 at Whitby.

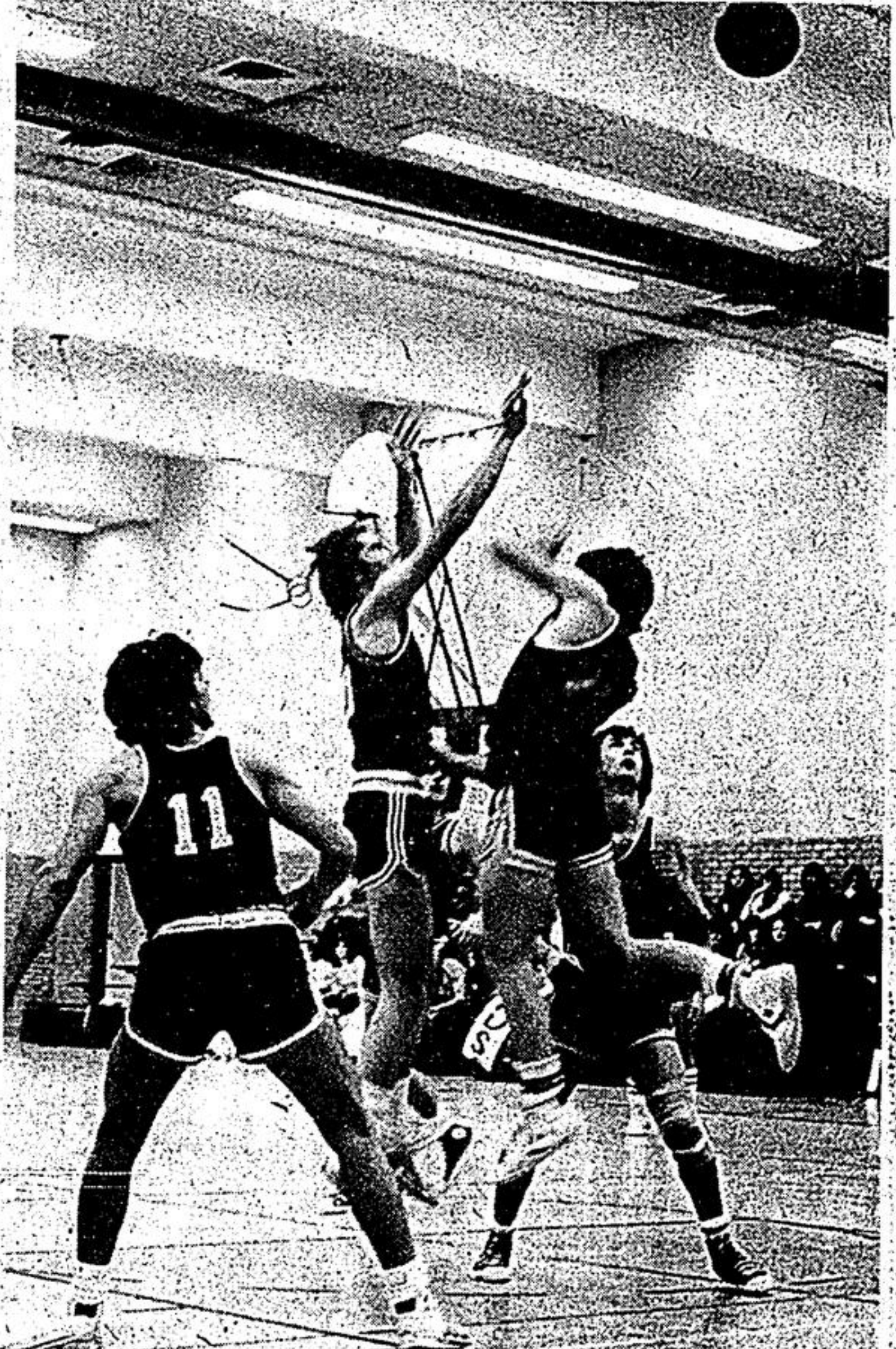
New volleyball program planned
