Growth worse than expected

Recently, we invited readers of this column to send us their suggestions for eliminating wasteful and excessive government spending.
Your response to this invitation has been encouraging, and to date we have received dozens of fine suggestions, ranging from the simple to the complex.
Reprinted below is a sampling of your letters. Taken together they prove that Canadians are still concerned about lean, sensible and efficient government.
A lawyer from Tottenham provided us with a startling example of how big government generates excessive waste. He told us about the experience of Alliston's Stevenson Memorial Hospital in filing its first submission to the Anti-Inflation Board.
The hospital, like many other groups across the country, worked many long, hard hours in preparing a budget which would meet confounding and sometimes contradictory AIB guidelines.
When the hospital's first submission was rejected by the AIB, the board of directors went back to work on a second required submission.
Again, after investing hundreds of man-hours and several thousands of dollars in the second submission, the hospital was notified that the AIB was still not satisfied.
The reason? The budget, totalling \$1,860,729 was found to contain wage levels for two employees exactly .72 cents per day above the guidelines! This negligible amount totals only \$76 per year, or .9 cents per hour for the two employees.
The hospital estimates it spent "many thousands of dollars" in preparing the submissions to the AIB. It certainly cost the government four or five thousand dollars to 'uncover' and haggle over this discrepancy.
The hospital administrator - disgusted with the whole ordeal - decided in the end to take the "excess" \$76 out of his own pay rather than put the hospital - and the taxpayer - through the additional expense of preparing another submission.
A reader from Hamilton believes there is unnecessary waste in the administration of the baby bonus. She suggests eliminating the bonus altogether and replacing it with an equal amount in tax cuts. The recipient would still receive the same cash amount, she writes, only now he would keep it in his take-home pay, rather than receive it in government cheques.
By eliminating the "middle-man" the reader estimates we could save many millions in administrative costs.
A Barrie reader agrees that the fat should be trimmed from the family allowance scheme, but she suggests that the present system should be retained with the following changes: Families earning under \$10,000 annually would not be taxed on their bonuses; those earning between \$10-20,000 would receive the bonus but would be taxed on them, while families earning over \$20,000, she feels, should not receive bonuses at all.
These changes, according to our reader, would trim the cost of the family allowance program while ensuring that those most in need of the bonus would benefit from it.
An Aurora man wrote that he was disgusted by the "\$2 million the government spent on the Royal Commission on Violence" but the "last straw", he said, was the announcement that ten MPs were going to Europe at public expense to study the role of the Ombudsman.
