Fatalities down chief says thanks

I would appreciate it if you would convey to the citizens of our community the appreciation of every member of this Force for accomplishing, during 1977, an excellent and enviable reduction in motor vehicle fatalities compared to the previous year.

During 1977, twenty-six persons died as a result of motor vehicle collisions on our roads, compared to forty-one in the previous year of 1976 — a reduction of 37 per cent. While we still consider the twenty-six people killed on our roads in one year to be far too many, we are confident that, with the continued cooperation of the motorists using the roads within this community, there will be a similar improvement in road deaths during 1978.

A short but lively discussion ensued concerning new insurance rates for the Stouffville Arena. Some confusion seems to exist as to what value the arena is insured for. Councillor Kamps felt that the policy, for which the town pays a premium rate, was meant to cover the entire replacement cost of a new arena if one were ever needed due to some mishap to the present structure. The written agreement put a ceiling value on the financial worth of the building leaving members of council' concerned about the real meaning of the insurance agreement.

The town has leased the area behind the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce parking lot for public parking. The town has a 10 year lease beginning in January, 1978, for the nominal sum of one dollar per year as a rental fee, with the town paying for all servicing of the lot.

The Ministry of Transportation and Communication has given the town slightly larger grants this year for road construction and maintenance, \$4,000 for the former, and \$157,000 for the latter.
