The rest of the games were low scoring, defensive affairs as the Gormley Greenhouses shut out Stouffville Lions 2-0.

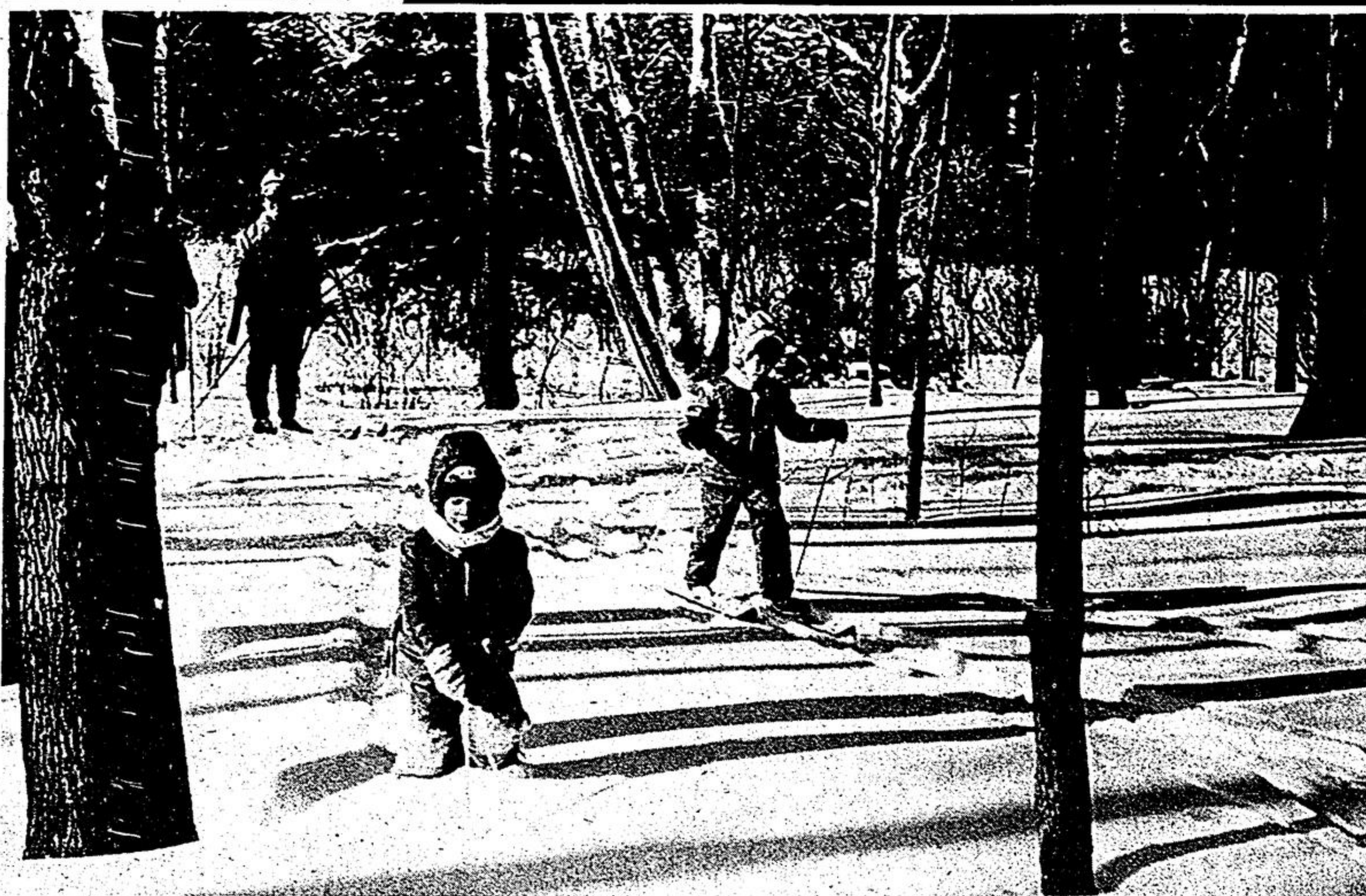
