K.R. 'Shine' Davis waited 6 months for his medal

STOUFFVILLE — It took almost six months, and numerous phone calls, but K. Ross Davis, one of Stouffville's most popular citizens, finally received his Silver Jubilee medal from the Queen.

Mr. Davis, better known as 'Shine' received word last summer that he had been selected for the honour along with former reeve George Richardson. The medal is awarded for those who have contributed outstanding service to their community.

Shine was born in Stouffville and lived here most of his life. He operated a tobacco and sundries shop and did tailoring and alterations in the back. His Main St. establishment with its pot-bellied stove was a favorite hangout for the older men in town until his retirement in 1972. Besides his business, Mr. Davis was also for many years the town's tax collector and was later appointed a Justice of the Peace.

also a long-time member of Richardson's Masonic lodge, and has an impressive attendance record. He only missed one meeting in 52 years.

Mr. Davis was quite surprised when the medal came. "I got this big parcel in the mail and said to myself, 'what the devil is that' " laughed Shine. However, he admitted that the medal was handsome and well worth waiting for. When he was asked when he would wear it, the irrepresible Shine quipped, "When I get married."

STOUFFVILLE — The response to the oranges and grapefruits from Texas was so positive in December that the SDSS student council has decided to hold a second sale of this fine fresh fruit. The people from Stouffville and the surrounding area who ordered fruit in December are being telephoned this week by students and are being asked if they wish another supply.

One new aspect of the sale is that the student council is going to ask the customers to pick up their fruit at the school, with

deliveries being made only in cases where the person has no means of getting to the school for their fruit.

Another feature of the sale will please our previous customers — the

price remains unchanged. Small cases of either oranges or grapefruit will cost \$5.75 for the 20-25 pound box. The large cases (40-44 pounds) still cost \$9.75 for either the oranges or ruby-red grapefruit.

Thrown eggs disgusting

NEWMARKET — Two Stouffville teenagers charged with assaulting two York Regional Police constables during an egg throwing melee on Stouffville's Main St. last Halloween night, were both placed on a \$200 recognizance to keep the peace after their actions

were described as "Disgusting" by Provincial Judge M. A. Charles.

Bruce Thornhill aged 19 and Michael Sprague also 19 heard the charges of assault dismissed however after Judge Charles had ruled there

was insufficient evidence to convict the two.

Both youths admitted they had been throwing eggs while mixing with about 250 other Halloween revellers on Main St., but each denied that the eggs they threw had hit constables Wilfred Hunter and John Thompson who were on foot patrol on the street that night.

Constable Hunter in his testimony described how youths threw eggs at cruisers in the area.

Defence counsel for the accused youths told the court that "Halloween in Stouffville is not a nice time" he added "egg throwing has become almost a game."

Whitby O.P.P. praises helpful snowmobilers

WHITBY — Last week's storm created great havoc but Whitby Ontario Provincial Police were full of praise for "a lot of people who opened up their homes to police and travellers — total strangers" in last week's storm.

A spokesman for the force said snowmobilers brought coffee and sandwiches to accident sites, and helped transport stranded motorists: "We want to say thank you!"

He said there was

little injury in most accidents, but last weekend additional accident reports were coming in thick and fast.

An Uxbridge woman died at the height of the storm, Thursday, January 26, when she was struck down on the shoulder of Hwy. No. 12 near Myrtle. OPP at Whitby said Elva Irene Rynard, 64, of Balsam St., Uxbridge left her husband's car at noon last Thursday and stood on the road shoulder of Hwy. No. 12 near Prospect Corners, 4 miles north of

Myrtle, where a multi-car accident blocked the road in blowing snow. She was struck down by a tractor trailer which swung over to avoid the first accident.

Fatal accident

A Willowdale woman on her way with her family to shop at Knob Hill Farms Market last Saturday morning died when the car in which she was a passenger collided with another at the intersection of Hwy. No. 7 and Woodbine Avenue. Police at Oak Ridges said a car driven by Guiseppi Aquino, 40, of Canes Avenue, Willowdale was eastbound on Hwy. No. 7 and made a left turn at Woodbine Avenue in the path of a westbound car driven by Sandra Booth, 25, of Bergen Road, Scarborough.

Dead is Rose Aquino, 63, a passenger in her son's car. Her husband, Raffaello Aquino, also a passenger, received head lacerations. Guiseppi was not injured. No one in the car wore seat belts. Miss Booth and her mother Mrs. Lorne Booth wore seat belts and were not injured, police said.

Damage to the cars, a 1970 Pontiac and a '75 Cougar was estimated at \$5,500.

Guiseppi Aquino has been charged under the Highway Traffic Act.

Wesley Jack killed in crash

A Stouffville man died early Saturday morning when his car crashed head-on into another vehicle on Hwy. No. 48 at Dickson's Hill, north of Markham.

Ontario Provincial Police, Oak Ridges, said Wesley P. Jack, 63, of 265 Second St., Stouffville was southbound at 5:15 a.m. in the northbound lane as a northbound car drove over the brow of a hill. Both cars swerved to the southbound lane and collided.

Mr. Jack had no seat belt. In his wallet he carried a letter from his doctor saying he was excused from wearing a seat belt. He died of severe chest injuries.

The driver of the northbound car, Gordon S. Frew, 33, of Sanford St., Newmarket was wearing a seat belt which was torn off in the accident. He received lacerations to chin and knees and his abdomen was sore. He was taken to Scarborough Centenary Hospital, and admitted for observation.

Total damage to cars which were written off, was estimated at \$7,000. (see Obituary page 9)
