## Clippers smash Uxbridge

Perry Brown, the hardworking fireplug and heart of the Stouffville Clippers, combined a remarkable 13 point effort with a new league scoring record in last Saturday's game against Uxbridge.

Perry, who led his team to a 21-7 walloping of the hapless Uxbridge squad, got two goals and 11 assists. His points gave him a total of 114, smashing the old record of 102 set last year.

And the amazing thing about it is Perry has two more games to play to add on to his total.

In the game the Clippers could do no wrong as they continually pummeled the shell-shocked Uxbridge goalie.

The line of Perry Brown, Mike Whelan and Tim Quinn scored a total incredible record of 34 points. Mike Whelan had six goals and four assists, Tim Quinn netted three goals and eight assists, and Perry contributed his 13 points.

The second line for the Clippers also fared pretty well as Ted Assinck collected four goals and four assists; Steve Schell contributed

three goals and two assists; and Doug Taylor had one goal and five assists for a total of 19 points.

The last of the Clippers points came from Glen Gibson with one goal and three assists, Steve Price one goal and one assist and Owen Heise had one assist.

The Clipper's had 61 shots on Uxbridge while Uxbridge fired 31 at Rick Marshman.

Unbelievably, the game started slowly with the Clippers taking a slim 3-2 lead, on goals by

Brown, Schell and Whelan.

In the second the Clippers started their bombing raids with eight goals and in the third they rounded things out with 10 more.

The Clippers played two previous games before the Uxbridge show, and they came away with a split decision.

On January 31 the Stouffville boys gave away their game against Lindsay 7-6.

In the first the Clippers managed only one goal from Mike Whelan, with Andy Leitch and Ted Assinck getting the assists. Lindsay stormed in five goals in the period past Brad Steel, while both the defence and forwards looked on.

In the middle frame the Clippers woke up a bit and proved they can play good aggressive hockey as they backchecked effectively. The result was five unanswered goals for Stouffville which drew them into a 6-5 lead. Goals were pocketed by Howie Jones with two, Steve Price, Steve Kirkland and Perry Brown, with assists going to Perry, two; Geoff Roy, two; Steve Schell, Rob McBeth and Andy Leitch.

In the third the Clippers reverted to their first period form, enabling Lindsay to pop

in two goals and give them the win.

Two nights later, February 2nd, the Clippers handled Port Hope easily for a 6-2 victory.

The highlight of the night was Perry Brown's, 99th, 100th and 101st points on 40 goals and 61 assists.

Geoff Roy opened the scoring on an unassisted goal on a shot from the point. Tim Quinn's first goal came from Steve Price and a minute later Tim pocketed another from Perry Brown to end the first.

In the second Port Hope scored two early power play goals before Geoff Roy scored on a Clipper power play, assisted by Perry Brown and Tim Quinn.

Stouffville hopes to wrap things up this Sunday in Port Hope at 2 p.m. The fifth game, if necessary, will be played Monday night in Stouffville.

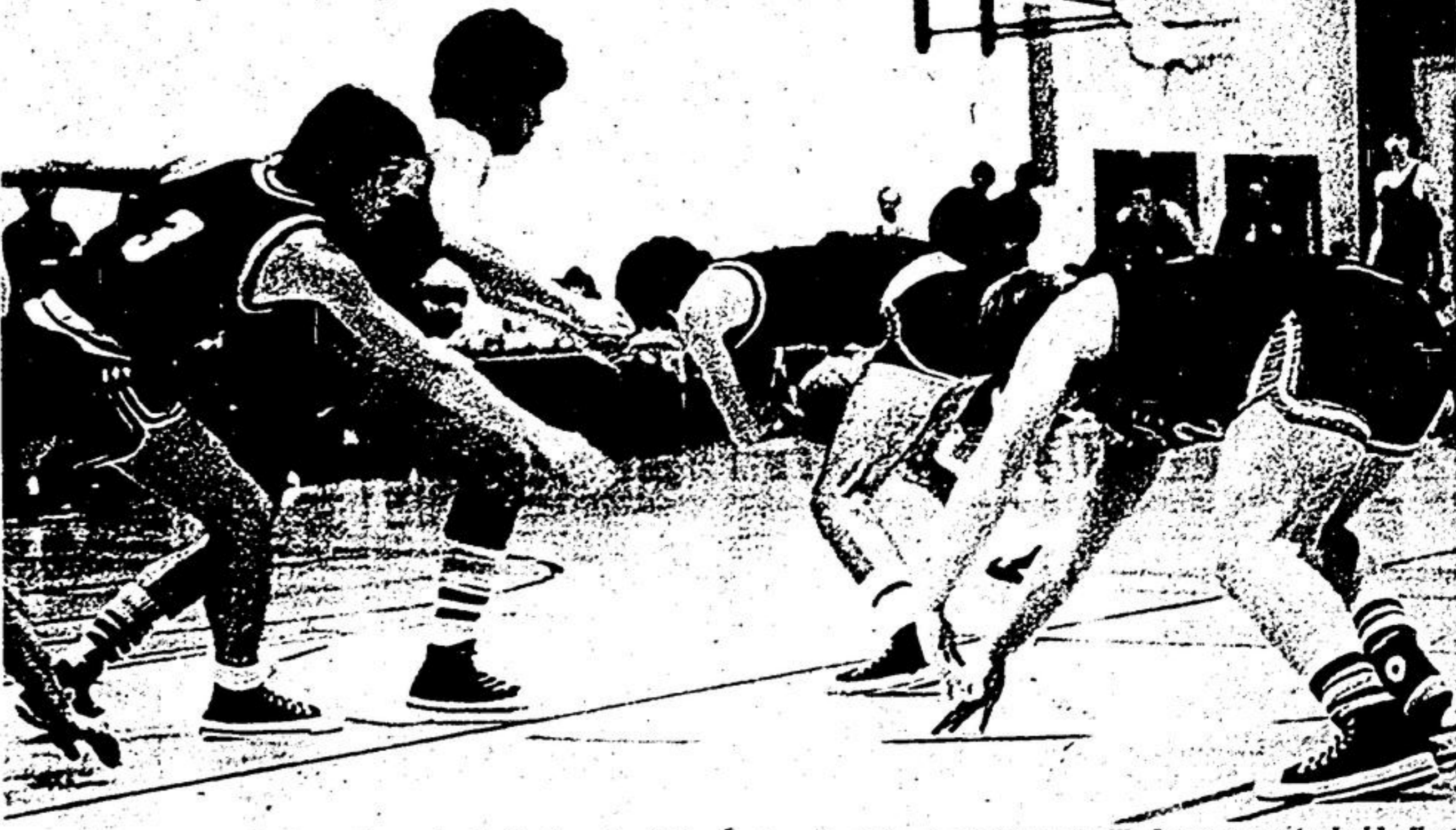
