# Meeting world needs

"Inasmuch," said Jesus to his disciples and to us, "as you have done it unto one of the least of these my brothers, you have done it unto me." (Matthew 25:40) Done what? Well, Jesus gets pretty specific: giving food to the hungry, drink to the thirsty, visiting the one in prison, taking in the stranger or homeless. Then, Jesus, do you mean just our friends or relations who are hungry or sick? No, and again Jesus is specific, "Inasmuch as you have done it to the least of my brothers" and Jesus' parable of the Good Samaritan makes it obvious that there is no limit to who are our brothers or neighbours.

But we are perplexed: in a world like ours, the needs of the hungry, the thirsty, the naked and the imprisoned

seem overwhelming. And, if we are truly honest, those needs can be quite nicely ignored in a country like ours where we have lots to eat, too much to drink, all the clothes we need and more. How do we even begin to help the crying needs of the rest of the world? And do we care? Yet Jesus' words ring in our ears: "Inasmuch as you did not do it to the least of these, you did it not to me." (Matthew 25:46). Jesus is aware not only of the wrongs we do, but (and probably more importantly) of the good that we fail to do. And failing to do that good to the least of my neighbours is a failure to love Jesus, an insult to His kingdom.

So we are commanded to love, to care, to feed and shelter. Far from being isolated from these crying needs of the world, the churches in this area are directly involved in Jesus'

commission. Each church through its own denomination has missionaries at work in every corner of the globe proclaiming the Gospel of Christ. Each denomination has teachers, nurses, doctors, nutritionists, agriculturalists helping people to learn to deal with their own problems. There is the well known Mennonite Central Committee with its work and Inter-Church Aid. Interdenominational agencies such as World Vision also has worldwide work. Many individual families in Stouffville sponsor children in needy areas through such organizations as the Christian Children's Fund of Canada. Money sent each month provides clothing, school supplies, medical care to a child who would otherwise likely have nothing.

Five denominations, Anglican, Presbyterian,

United, Roman Catholic and Lutheran participate together in a program entitled 10 Days for World Development. The aim of the program is to educate people of our country to the needs and the concerns of the rest of the world, so we can use our knowledge to best aid people in the world. A Stouffville 10 Days Committee has been meeting and will be sponsoring a forum focusing on the Canadian Food Policy and how it affects us. The forum will be held Monday, March 6 at St. James Presbyterian Church at 7:30 p.m. Admission is free and all are welcome. More information will appear in this paper in another week.

People are in need throughout the world; they are hungry, they are in despair. We in this most blessed country have to learn how to share our riches with the world. And, for those thousands who are without hope, we have the Gospel of Jesus — a word of love and hope and abundant life — to proclaim. May we never become so complacent as to ignore the needs of the world. Jesus still cries out, "Inasmuch as you do it to even the least, you do it unto me."

# Problems between labour and management are now often resolved before they become disputes.

## That's what Ontario's Preventive Mediation is all about.

Preventive Mediation is a new service offered by the Ontario Conciliation and Mediation Service of your Ontario Ministry of Labour. Here's how it works:

Sometimes after contract negotiations have ended and an agreement has been signed, there may be issues that have left a bad taste for both management and labour.

Positions may harden and these issues may become barriers in the next round of negotiations. A monitoring system alerts the Service to the need for early

involvement of a mediator in this kind of situation. The mediator contacts the parties and explores the possibility of discussions before the next round of negotiations. Free from the atmosphere of crisis bargaining, the mediator can help the parties discuss the tough issues, identify the cause of friction and promote understanding and cooperation.

First agreement negotiations are often deadlocked because of a breakdown in the relationship of the bargaining parties. The preventive mediator works to improve this relationship, encourage discussion and ease the way to contract settlement.

No mediation service can be complete that only deals with crisis bargaining and ignores the underlying causes that give rise to the dispute.
