A cure for uncertainty

Seeking a term to describe our present time, Kenneth Galbraith labelled it the "Age of Uncertainty." Uncertainty is certainly an outstanding characteristic of our day. Political uncertainty has recently become very real to us. The crises in government and the threat of separation testify to this fact. The build-up of nuclear weapons and the exposure of intelligence scandals only heighten our uncertainty.

Financial uncertainty is also very real to us. According to the

November 1976 Reader's Digest, the average Canadian Family of four owns at least \$4,000 excluding the money borrowed to purchase a house. Add to this our high inflation rate, our high unemployment and our frightening national debt as well as our dollar fluctuations and it all adds up to a very uncertain outlook for the future.

Marriage break-up and common-law liaisons lead to uncertainty in our personal relationships. Confusion in our sex and marriage roles leads to further uncertainty. Many of us lack a sense of personal fulfillment and meaning in our lives.

"How can my life have purpose and meaning?" we ask. What is life all about anyway?

We are also uncertain about what constitutes right and wrong. People ask, "How can I know what is right or wrong?" Right seems to be what most people consider to be right at any particular time. We are bombarded with so many ideas that we do not know what to believe. We are uncertain about what is really true.

To crown all of this is the very uncertainty of life itself, the fact that we may die or be killed at any moment and that we will certainly die some day. The result of this uncertainty is a paralyzing fear which most of us are afraid to admit or face.

God has provided the answers to many of these problems in the Bible. We can be certain about God. God created the world and He maintains it and cares for each individual in it. He knows our names and He is concerned about the smallest details in our lives. He cares so much that He sent His Son to take the punishment that we deserve. God is good and cares for us and our world.

We can be certain about man. We can know who man is and what his purpose is here on earth. God made man and placed him on earth to enjoy life. God gave man guidelines for his life. If we follow these guidelines then we will have a fulfilled and meaningful life. Rejection of these guidelines have resulted in dissatisfaction and uncertainty.

Guidelines are provided to make our personal relationships full and meaningful. God planned that one man and one woman would live together in a lifelong commitment to each other and to God. God intended that they should be spiritually, mentally and physically one. Within this stable bond children are to be born and nurtured.

The cure for uncertainty is found then in obeying God's guidelines.

Other approaches will lead to despair and hopelessness.

Charitable donations

STOUFFVILLE - Charitable donations totalling \$600 to 10 organizations caused lengthy debate at the last meeting of town council before they were approved.

Councillor Bill McNalley felt that donations to such organizations should be left to the individual donor and that governing bodies such as

town or regional councils should not contribute to these groups.

Mr. McNalley's opposition did not stem from his own lack of support or from the feeling that the organizations involved did not do worthwhile work, he said, but from a feeling that the donations from political bodies were both redundant and presumptuous.

THE COUNCIL OF THE REGIONAL MUNICIPALITY OF YORK PROPOSES TO PASS A BY-LAW AUTHORIZING:

1. The widening of Kennedy Road (Regional Road No. 3) in the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville from a point approximately 1500 feet north of Stouffville Road (Regional Road No. 14) to a point approximately 4200 feet north thereof to a basic width of 120 feet, with additional widenings at cuts and fills, together with the clearing, grubbing, fencing, grading, gravelling and paving thereof to provide a basic two lane roadway and the construction of culverts, drainage works and all other related works and undertakings and the acquisition of the necessary lands and interest in lands.

2. The widening of Stouffville Road (Regional Road No. 14) in the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville from a point approximately 1200 feet west of its most easterly intersection with Kennedy Road (Regional Road No. 3) to a point approximately 500 feet east thereof to a basic width of 100 feet, with additional widenings at cuts, fills and the intersection with the proposed realigned Kennedy Road (Regional Road No. 3), the clearing, grubbing, fencing, grading, gravelling and paving thereof to provide a basic two lane roadway with additional turning lanes at the intersection with the proposed realigned Kennedy Road (Regional Road No. 3), and the construction of culverts, drainage works and all other related works and undertakings and acquisition of the necessary lands and interest in lands.

The Engineering Committee of the Regional Council will, at its meeting to be held at 2:00 p.m. on the 14th of March, 1978, at the Engineering Building on the west side of Woodbine Avenue one and one-quarter miles north of the Aurora Side Road, hear in person or by his counsel, solicitor or agent, any person who claims that his lands will be prejudicially affected by the by-law and who applies to be heard.
