## Three injured in crash with tow truck

Three persons were injured in an accident last Thursday when a vehicle turning left collided with a second vehicle that was attempting to pass.

Ronald Baker, 20, of R.R. 3 Stouffville was taken to York County Hospital where he is in intensive care with broken ribs, a collapsed lung and facial lacerations.

Mr. Baker, the son of Stan Baker, was operated on and his spleen removed following the accident.

Ontario Provincial Police from the Oak Ridges Detachment said Mr. Baker was southbound on Highway 48

around 2 p.m. and slowed to make a left turn onto the Bethesda sideroad when his car was struck by a second southbound vehicle which had pulled out to pass the slower moving car.

Passengers in the Baker car, Julie Reman, 17, and Randy Reman, both of Stouffville, were taken to hospital, treated and released.

Kenneth Woods, 17, of R.R. 2, Markham, was driving the second vehicle, a Budget Towing truck which was hauling a car at the time. Mr. Woods was checked by a doctor for bruises.

Damage to the three vehicles is estimated at \$3,000. According to police charges are pending against Mr. Baker.
