Late Harvey Moyer

Progressive farmer

Harvey W. Moyer, Past Master of Richardson's Masonic Lodge (1947-48) died last Thursday, April 6, in his 92nd year.

Mr. Moyer, the eldest son of David Moyer and Fanny Wideman, was born on the family farm at Dickson's Hill where his nephew Warren lives today.

Unitl 1944 Mr. and Mrs. Moyer owned and operated the former Pipher farm with its stone house built in 1861. The farm is immediately south of the Moyer homestead.

He farmed through the depression and war years and had one of the first accredited Holstein -dairy herds in the district.

Before local hydro available operated a milker with electricity from a Delco generator. When he started farming threshing was done by steam-engine, which required about 10 men to operate. Before retiring he had his own threshing equipment which could be operated by one man.

After leaving the farm Mr. Moyer built a home on Lloyd Ave., Stouffville. This was the first house in a field south of the location of the former livery stable.

Unitl 1953 he sold real estate for J.A. Williams farm agency and made many friends through his business contacts.

In 1949 his wife Helen (Nellie Campbell) died and a few years later he and the former Emily Hurst of Buffalo were married. The couple moved to North Miami Beach, Florida, bought a lot there and Mr. Moyer built a house.

He lived almost 25 moving to Miami he had in Florida, vears returning to Canada after the death of his Emily and when his own health had begun to decline. He


