Juveniles bounce back

After their 13-5 drubbing at the hands of Amesbury, the Stouffville juveniles bounced back last week with impressive wins over North Bendale and Malton. The wins gave the local softball crew a share of first place in the mighty North York Juvenile league.

Last Wednesday saw a battle of rivals as the finalists in the 1977 Ontario Summer Games met for the first time since North Bendale beat Stouffville 3-2 to win the Games "gold medal."

This year, however, the local squad gained the initial upper hand. With Jim Chilvers fire-balling at mid-season form and slugger Dave Dart's batting skills dominating, the local crew earned a well-deserved 3-2 victory. Chilvers gave up 5 hits, struck out 14 batters, and went 2 for 4 at the plate while Dart homered in the top of the ninth with catcher Rob McBeth on first base to give the May-Dart-Schell team their winning margin.

Second baseman Mike Lafleur and centre fielder Steve Schell then came up with two sparkling fielding plays to preserve Chilvers fourth win of the season. One week tonight (June 29th) at 8:30 p.m., these same two teams square off here in Stouffville to decide first place, at least temporarily.

On Thursday night, it was Chilvers's fine pitching that again predominated as the young hurler allowed just 3 hits while striking out 18 in Stouffville's 9-1 win over Malton. The visitors

jumped out to an early 1-0 lead, but the Stouffville bats soon prevailed. Chris Jackson and Brad Steel led all batters with 3 hits in 4 trips to the plate as Stouffville led 2-1 after two innings, 3-1 after four, and 6-1 after six. Steve Spang was outstanding defensively and easily won honours as the game's outstanding performer. The spunky third baseman made

several dazzling plays and batted 2 for 4 in the leadoff spot. Tonight, Stouffville meets Bramalea in an 8:30 p.m. contest with Chilvers and Rob McBeth the starting battery for the locals. Next Thursday, North Bendale will be the visitors for what should be the highlight of this early juvenile season.

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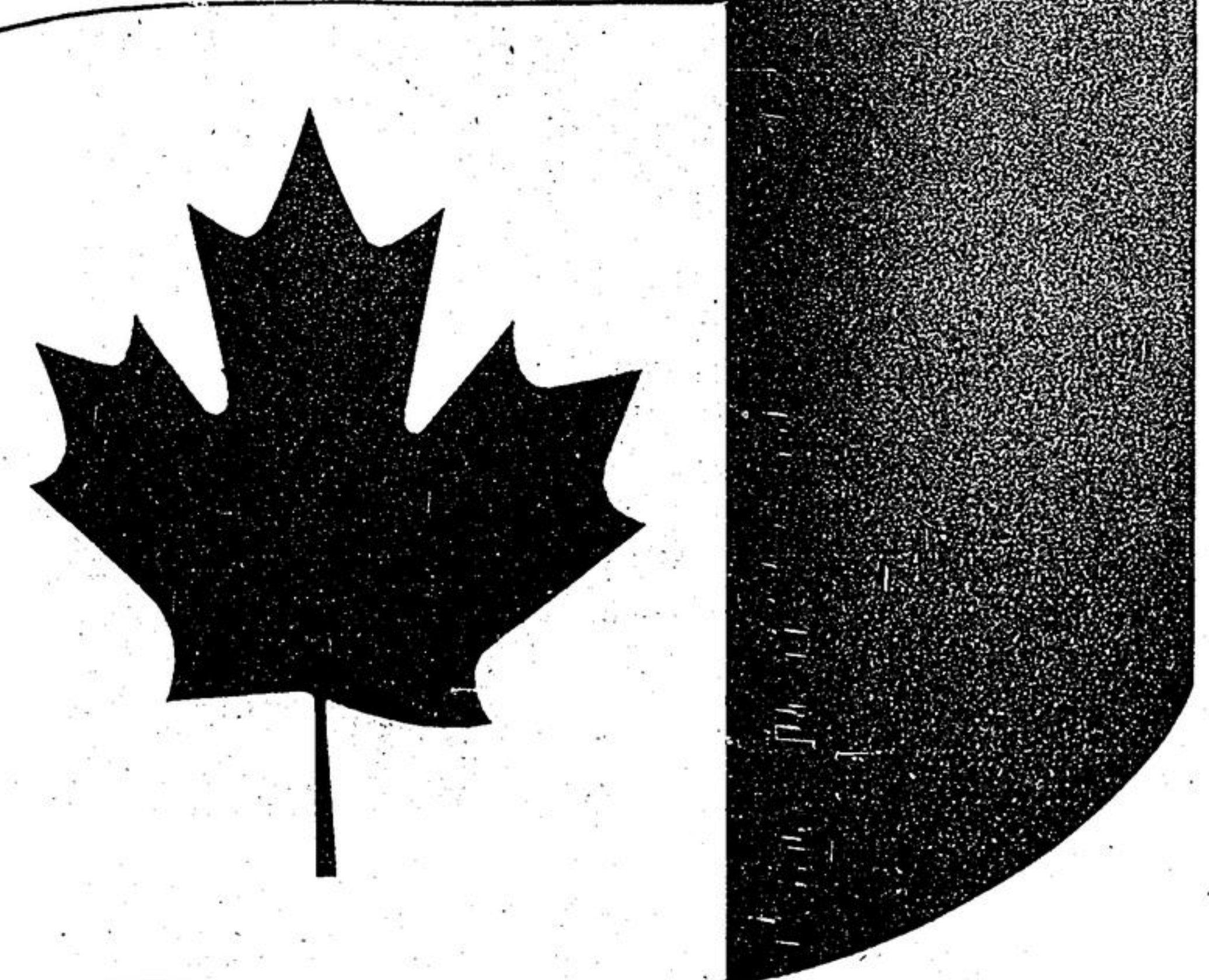
