## Sheep Focus at fairgrounds

The new Markham Fairground was filled with sheep, sheep products and sheep dogs last week at the Sheep Focus '78 show.

The show featured demonstrations of various spinning wheels, including the Markham Guild women showing the use

of an 125 year old, six foot high walking wheel.

Along with spinning, there was a huge sheep auction, sheep burgers, and an amazing sheep herding display outside in the fair race track.

Probably the biggest attraction,

however, was two very rare sheepdogs. The dogs, Bundi (see picture) and Aniko, are from the Komondorok breed. Their owner, Grace Lush of Owen Sound, said there were only 50 such dogs in Canada.

The dogs, she said "are used just to guard the sheep, not to herd them." The breed is originally from Hungary, and their heavy, wool like strips of fur gives them their unique qualities, she noted.
