# Juveniles take quarter finals

The first game saw Jim strike out 13 batters, while allowing just five hits.

It was actually a close scoring affair until the late innings when

Steve Schell broke it open with a bases loaded triple, scoring three runs. Dave Dart also had a hot bat, swatting out two hits, while Randy Grant, in only his second game at third base, was superb.

The second game was played last Saturday in Cobourg, and Jim put in an even finer performance, whiffing 14 batters, and allowing three hits.

Stouffville collected 14 hits in the game. The top three batters were

Dave Dart, who went four for five at the plate including a homer; Rob McBeth, three for five and a home run, and Brad Steel, two for four at the plate, also hitting a homer.

The biggest play of the game came in the early innings with our Juveniles ahead by just two runs. Dave Dart and Randy Grant combined on a great throwing combination to put a Cobourg runner out at home plate to end the

inning. That out put a visible sag in Cobourg's play.

Mention should also go to Mike Lafleur who grabbed everything hit his way at second base.

The next round in the playoffs won't start till next week, and the Juveniles wrap up their league play tonight (Thursday) at home against Bendale at 8:30 p.m.
