Christian Blind Mission

Organization needs help

STOUFFVILLE. — The Christian Blind Mission has a job to do. Art Brooker, the Canadian Director, says to do it "we need a lot more personnel and a lot more money."

That's the major reason why the Christian Blind Mission International has opened their first Canadian office in Stouffville.

The Blind Mission is a world-wide non-denominational organization working both independently and with 164 mission boards in 63 nations to help blind and handicapped individuals, explained Mr. Brooker.

It's really a "duel ministry," founded in 1908 by the German pastor Ernst Christoffel, to serve the spiritual and

the physical needs of man.

The Blind Mission operates leprosy clinics, schools for the blind, performs eye operations, trains eye doctors, teaches disease prevention and more.

Mr. Brooker said for the work to continue the mission needs more trained people and funds to support it. He was hired as a liaison officer to attract the surplus of trained people in Canada and the plentiful resources needed elsewhere.

Qualified doctors, nurses, farmers, and engineers with a genuine interest in healing the sick, willing to overlook working conditions and salary are needed urgently, noted Mr. Brooker.
