His son, David Barthau, explained, "We'd toyed with the idea of opening another store in Markham," adding they found they had a lot of customers in Stouffville, so it seemed logical to locate here.

David will be the manager of the Stouffville store. He feels quite sure he'll be up in Stouffville all the time, indicating "That way you get to know more people, and serving the people is the business we're in."

Lloyd Barthau learned much of his craft under L.V. Ostrander, whose large watch-making giant prospered during the war. Since then, he's continually taken courses in diamond setting and jewellery grading from the Gemological Institute of America to upgrade his knowledge of a complex field.

His son has accompanied him to these classes, as well as standing at the top of his class in watch-making

and repairing at George Brown College and in Switzerland, where he was awarded a scholarship.

During his studies at George Brown, David kept a hand in the business world by working at his father's store in Markham. He's also taught advanced level courses at George Brown.

Some of the staff has already been hired for the new store, according to David. They are Janet Arends, and Margaret Schell.

Services offered at the new store will be identical with those of the

old, including watch and jewellery repairs, engraving, and evaluation. The stock will also be similar — rings, watches, china, silverware, grandfather clocks, and jewellery.

STOUFFVILLE — Baking is a craft dating back about 4,000 years. Ralph Di Marco is proud to have been part of the profession for the last 25 years. He brings much experience as head baker to the Villa Italian Bakery, Edward St., in which he is a partner.

The 5,000 square foot establishment was built by Mr. Di Marco along with three other men, Mario Marcellini, the accountant, Sam Degliangeli, company vice-president, and Tony Degliangeli, the store manager, for about \$500,000.

Mr. Marcellini said the opening date would be next Thursday, Sept. 14, if all goes according to plan.

"We've suffered a few setbacks," he said, adding it was worth waiting for. He felt "people will be surprised when it opens."

Their operation will

be more than just a bakery. You'll be able to purchase sliced white, french, and Italian bread, along with pastries and cakes. The store will also carry convenience grocery items, pointed out Mr. Di Marco.

Mario Marcellini explained there will also be a sandwich bar where hot veal cutlets on a Kaiser bun, cold cuts, lasagna, and stuffed peppers will be for sale. "Let me tell you, they're really good," he exclaimed.

This marks the end of a six year search to find a suitable location for the shop. Mr. Di Marco, a new arrival to Thicketwood Blvd., and Tony Degliangeli, a Stouffville resident, both said it would be a pleasure to work in such clean, friendly surroundings. The two other men reside in Thornhill.

"We hope we can be of service to the people," Mr. Marcellini concluded.

During the twister, explained Mrs. Young, "You couldn't see anything, except for two pieces of Roy Lewis' barn flying across the pond."

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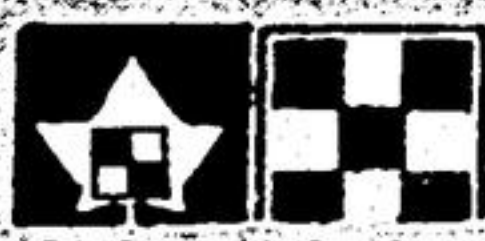

A public meeting will be held by the Planning Committee of the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville, as noted above, to present and discuss the following proposed OFFICIAL PLAN AMENDMENT:

"Proposed Amendment No. 16 to the Official Plan of the Village of Stouffville, now in the Whitchurch-Stouffville planning area, which changes the land use designation from 'INDUSTRIAL' to 'COMMERCIAL' on part of BLOCK F, PLAN 568 (MAIN STREET WEST). The subject site consisting of approximately 6 679.5 square metres (1.7 acres) has a frontage of 61.0 metres (200 feet) on the north side of Main Street West immediately west of Patrick Motors, 477 Main Street West. The proposed amendment results from an application to permit a home centre which will sell hardware, appliances and furniture."

You are invited to attend the meeting and to state your support or objection to the proposed amendment. Should you be unable to attend, written submissions will be received up to the time of the meeting. The amending document may be examined at the Municipal Building, 19 Civic Avenue, Stouffville during regular business hours. (8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.)
