Peewees lose in finals

Stouffville's Peewee soccer club was just a few steps away from capturing their division championship at last week's second annual Whitchurch - Stouffville Centennial tournament.

The Peewees, the most successful of the local teams in the tournament, ran out of gas in their

final game against Hillcrest, after playing a superb, but exhausting semi-final match against Uxport.

The Delicatessen Restaurant and Tavern team was the only home team to make it into the playoffs.

They went through Saturday's elimination

round, with a whopping 6-2 victory over Midland-Caledonia, then lost a squeaker to Hillcrest 2-1. Despite that loss, they were still able to advance to the semi-finals.

In those two games Karl Luefong led the offense with four goals, while Gordon Marshall had two and Tim

Yeomans picked up a single.

In the Peewee semi-final the boys edged Uxport (comprised of Uxbridge and Port Perry players), 2-1 on two goals by Jimmy Edwards. The game was one of the best played in the tourney, but the fast pace took its toll on Stouffville.

Only a few hours later the team had to face Hillcrest in the final, and although they held Hillcrest scoreless in the first half, they just couldn't keep up the pace and eventually lost 4-0. All goals came late in the second half.

Alfons Rubbens, past-president and one of the organizers of the tourney, commented that "the boys just burned themselves up in the semi-final game," they were totally exhausted. However, it's still quite an achievement to have a local club in the finals.

Besides the Peewees, Hillcrest also captured a second championship, in the Atom division.

In the semi-final Hillcrest, from Willowdale, knocked off Aurora to advance to the finals against Chinguacousy, who triumphed over their Aurora opponent.

For the second year in a row the Hillcrest team proved unbeatable as they took the championship with an 8-0 victory.

The third championship Mosquito division was taken by Midland-Caledonia in a wild final game.

The Midland team reached the final after defeating Aurora; while their opposition, Malton, defeated Newmarket.

The Midland-Malton final was undoubtedly the closest of the day. Regular play ended in a 1-1 tie. Two periods of overtime followed but the teams were still deadlocked. The game was finally won by Midland after the tie-breaking penalty kick matchup.

Hockey sign-ups simpler
