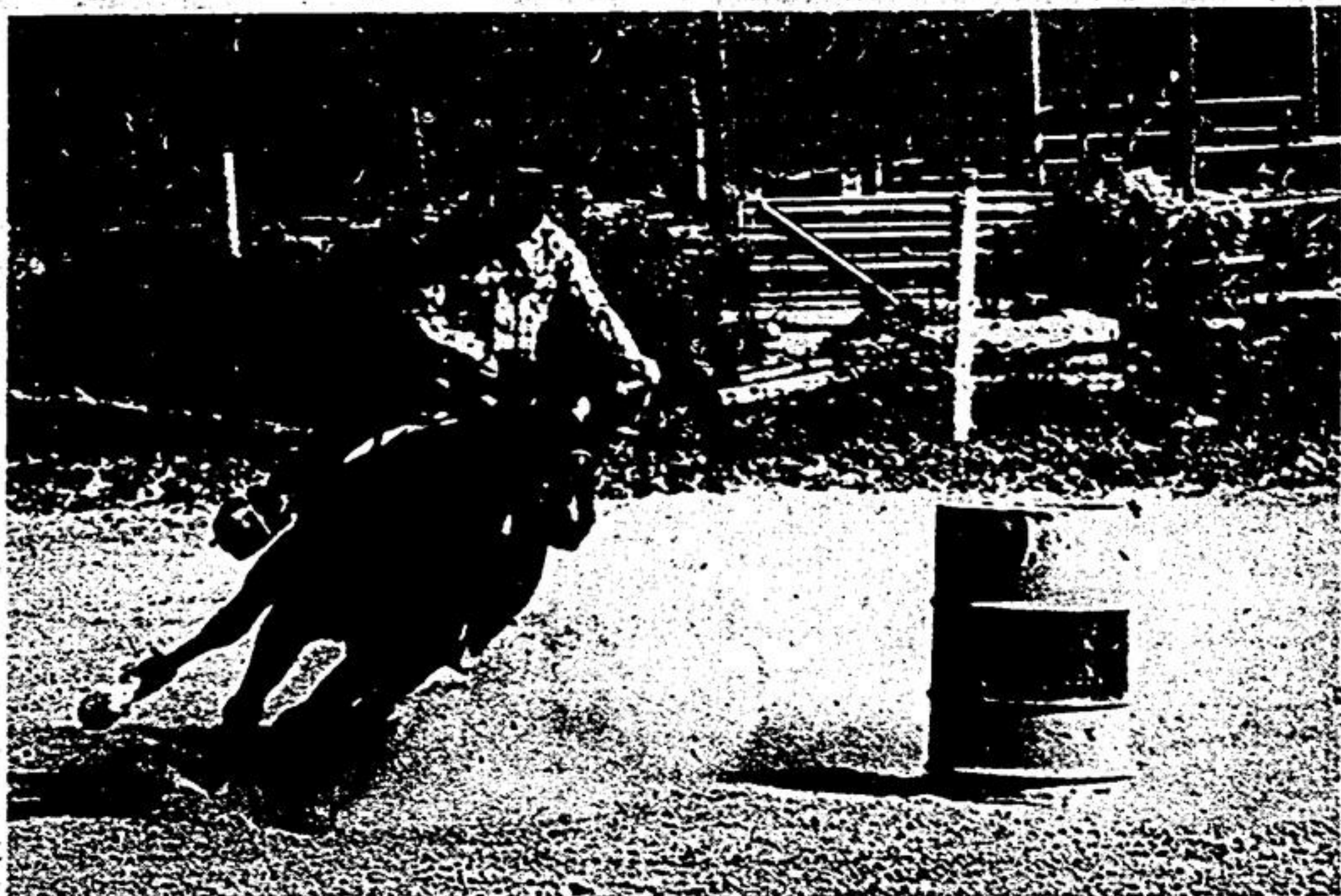
Admission is \$2 for adults and \$1 for children. Some of the stars on the Community Centre team that will be showing off their donkey riding abilities include;

## New judo points system - undefeated, but still a loser

It seems in the sport of judo, just because you win all your matches doesn't mean you're the best.

Or so it is under the new points system that three local participants

ran up against last Saturday.

Karen, Cathy and Steven Sheffield, who have been winning judo titles hand over fist the past few years, had their first taste of the new system at the Ontario Seniors in Toronto, with very frustrating results.

Karen, 17, found out the hard way just what the new system means. She went through her under 134 lb. class undefeated, but came in second place.

And in one of her matches, she defeated what proved to be the eventual division winner.

Apparently the judo organization is trying to find a new system of scoring, "but this one sure isn't working," Marg Sheffield, mother of the three said.

The number of points for a win depends on how you defeat your opponent. A certain winning hold or

throw is worth more points than another one, so in fact a competitor can win just a few matches, and the title, by the larger point throws, while another might win all his or her matches, but by holds of less value, thereby having less points. Such was the case for Karen.

Cathy Sheffield also ran into the same problem, winning seven out of her eight matches in the under 114 lb class, but coming in second

place, despite beating the eventual winner.

The third Sheffield, Steven, 15 won five of six matches, beat the second place finisher, and came in third in the under 143 lb class.

"It was just incredible, no one knew who won or why they won. It really is a silly way to score and there's been a lot of complaints about it. Hopefully, it will be changed soon," Mrs. Sheffield said.

The Clippers have lost five overaged players from last year's squad, including the leagues record scorer Perry Brown.

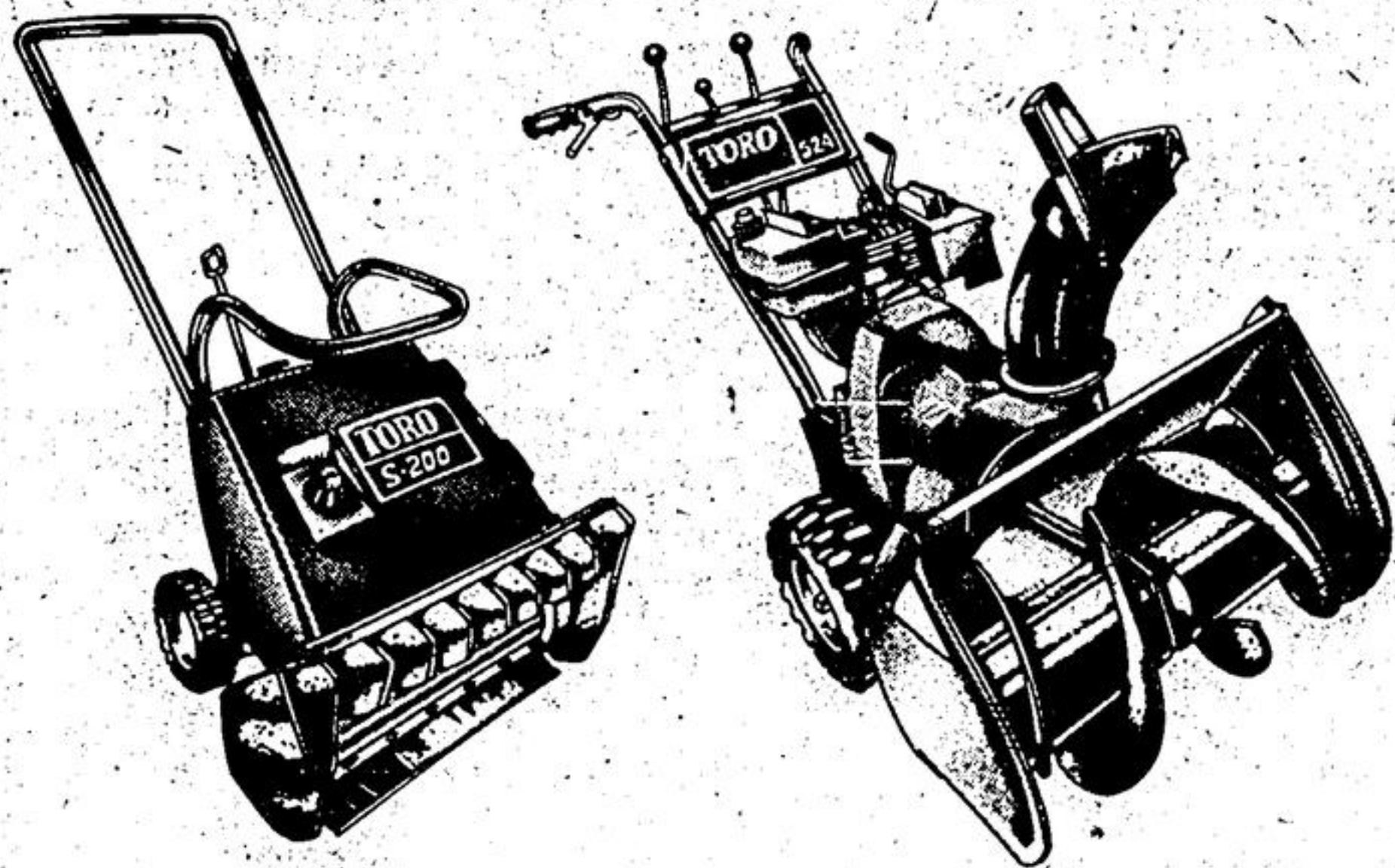
Ken May is back sponsoring the team, and
