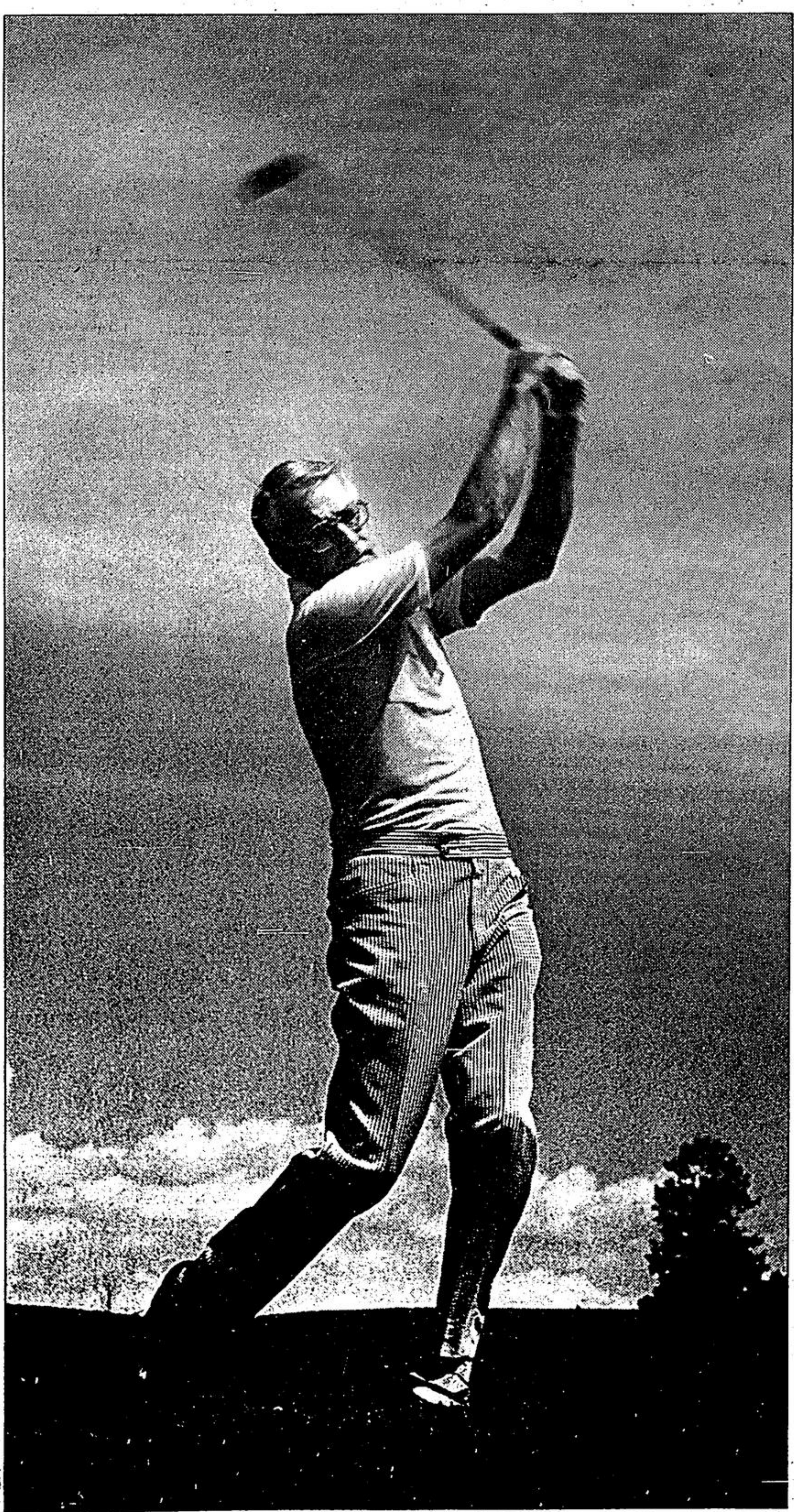
## Remember Julie?
