# Family refused welfare

Dear Editor,  
Recently this week, I came up against an unbendable Government rule, which made me sick.

My husband has been on strike since the beginning of July. He receives \$50.00 per week strike pay. We have a two year old and another baby due by Christmas. I'm having a very complicated pregnancy and under doctor's orders to stay off my feet and rest; otherwise, I would be out tramping the streets for a job.

We haven't been able to pay rent, hydro or any other bills since the strike. Ma Bell has threatened to remove our phone unless our bills are kept up to date and paid in full each month. Since we live in the "sticks" of Stouffville and being under medical care, we can't get along without this "luxury." Hydro has been a little more understanding, although I don't think it can go on for too much longer.

This \$50.00 per week enables us to buy enough bread, macaroni, hotdogs and enough milk for the baby for a week plus gas for the car for my

husband to do strike duty and look around for a temporary job. (without success)

We can't afford vitamin pills for my pregnancy nor have we been able to turn the heat on in the house during this cold weather. We simply can't afford the hydro or oil to do this. Last week the warmest temperature in the house was 51 degrees. It was pretty cold and drafty.

Finally swallowing my pride, I called the welfare office in Oshawa for assistance. They were very polite about the whole thing, but informed us they couldn't give us a penny due to a rule they have about labor disputes. Pretty choked up, I asked if this meant the Government would stand to see our hydro turned off and freeze and starve to death, or worse evicted from our home because we couldn't pay rent. They were sympathetic, but the answer still remained the same. I was under the impression the Government would assist a family in need, no matter what the circumstances. Obviously, I was wrong. The lady at

Welfare told me "off the record" the only way they could help in my situation was if my husband left me. Then they'd take care of my son and I. Imagine!! Now they're breaking up families to "assist" you.

I called the Member of Parliament for Whitchurch-Stouffville, but he didn't return my call.

If my husband could get another job, he'd be there. He's not the type to sit around. However, the minute a company knows you're on strike, they refuse to give you a second look. The thing is, even if my husband was called back to work tomorrow, we couldn't afford to pay our back rent and bills in a million years.

So, I sit here at 2 a.m., writing this because I can't sleep. I should have cried myself to sleep hours ago, but I'm too angry. I'm angry at myself for ever believing that Government takes care of people in need. I'm also angry that people who make up the Government, would allow these so-called "rules" to exist.

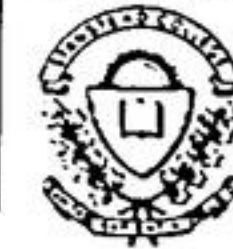
when officers attempted to arrest him for causing a disturbance. Comeau was described as in a drunken condition and trying to pick fights. He was fined \$100.
