Well-known resident dies

PICKERING — This community was saddened on Sept. 21 when word was received on the sudden passing of a well-known resident, G. Clifford Barrett. He died of a heart attack in his 72nd year.

Born in 1907, the son of Murray and Mabel Barrett, he grew up in Pickering Township and spent all his life there. His childhood days were spent on a farm just east

of the village, on Kingston Road.

Forty-six years ago, he married Edith Hardy, and shortly thereafter moved to their present residence on Brock Road.

Though Mr. Barrett was a farmer, working 50 acres of land, he was better known for his very successful venture, Barrett's Feeds. He was a straw and hay dealer, the official supplier to the Royal Winter Fair and E.P. Taylor. He was known from "the west to the east," according to his wife, Edith.

The business grew from the one feed outlet he purchased when he was only 24 years old, and continued to expand. His wife noted he was a very ambitious man.

Mr. Barrett and his wife enjoyed travelling, when time permitted. He was particularly fond of visiting with his nieces, nephews, and friends of the family. Mr. Barrett was a member of the Pickering United Church.

Mr. Barrett still managed to find time for a favourite hobby — judging and showing heavy horses at fall fairs across the province.

Mr. Barrett is survived by his wife, Edith; brothers Ivan and Vernon, and one sister, Mildred (Mrs. Russel Trousdale). He is predeceased by sisters Carman and Bernice.

Services were conducted Sept. 24 by Rev. Melville Butters and Rev. Frank Van Vein from the McEachnie Funeral Home, Kingston Road, Pickering Village.

The pall bearers were Ronald Barrett, Robert Trousdale, Howard Mashinter, Percy Pugh, Rory McDonald, and George Alsop. Interment was made at the Erskine Cemetery.

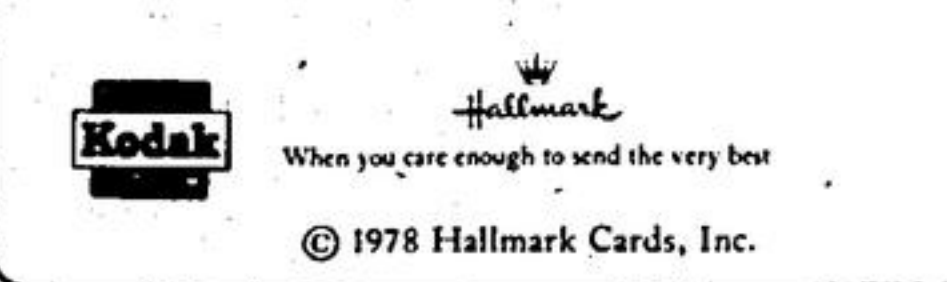

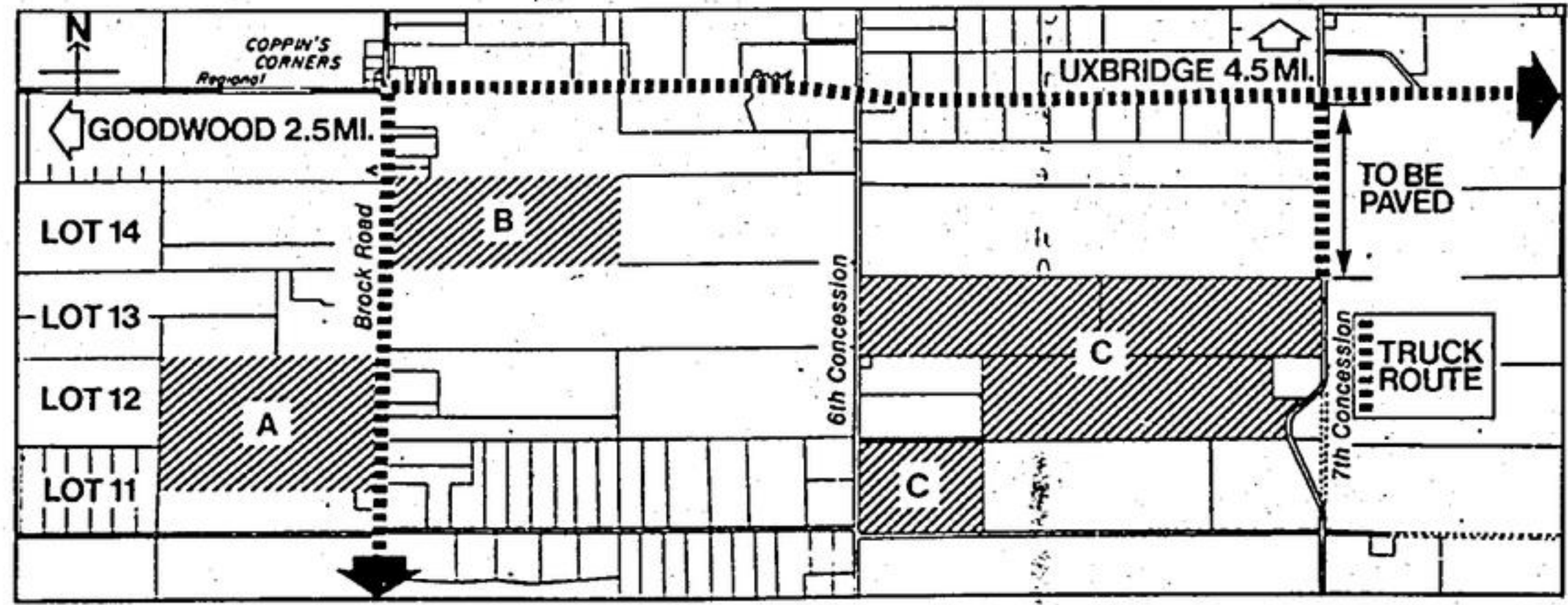

An open letter to the people of The Township of Uxbridge

I am writing this letter to clear up the misunderstandings concerning the role of my company in supplying sand and gravel for the road building program in Ontario.

As you know I have made a proposal to the township council to pay a levy of 6-1/2¢ per ton on the gravel extracted from the B and C properties, and I respectfully suggest that the increased cash revenue to the township could be used to help defer future increases in property taxes which have already gone up by 9% over the past year and by comparable amounts in preceding years.

In addition, I have agreed to pave the 7th Concession Road from the gravel pit north to Durham Road 21. This means that most trucks will travel the route indicated on the map (see below).



I would like to make it clear that I am **not** applying for a licence to take more gravel out of my Uxbridge properties. The total tonnage involved will **not** increase—it simply means that the gravel will be taken from a different location and as a result there will be no increase in the truck traffic in this area.

It is my sincere hope that this statement of my concern will help clear up the misunderstandings surrounding this matter.
