

# Town man opens own butcher shop

**BALLANTRAE** — resident of 23 years, plans to start his own business. "I've always wanted my own butcher shop," noted John Foulds. "But with seven children, I was never able to afford it." Now that some of his children are grown up, Mr. Foulds, a Stouffville

As well as stocking farm fresh meats, including beef, poultry, lamb, and pork, Mr. Foulds will provide custom cutting and delivery services, and will fill freezer orders. "The meat business is my trade," said Mr. Foulds. "It's in my blood." He started working for his father as a butcher's delivery boy when he was only 11 years old. He came to Canada 23 years ago, to learn the self-serve meat industry.

He only intended to stay one year, but became an assistant meat manager in a Loblaw's store downtown. Mr. Foulds has also worked in several local slaughterhouses in Stouffville, and was the meat manager at the IGA.

There's a lot of hard work involved in the business, according to Mr. Foulds. Lifting 300 pound slabs of beef isn't easy, though he admits one acquires a knack for it. Mr. Foulds is quite used to the physical demands, though, after having held down two jobs for the last 20 years. Now, however, he plans to concentrate more on his butcher shop.

# Problem—the autistic child

**YORK REGION** — Five year old Derek Lehman of Newmarket is an autistic child.

What is his problem? Autism, according to the dictionary, is "a state of mind characterized by daydreaming, hallucinations and disregard of external reality".

David Lehman, the little lad's father told The Tribune that in York Region, autism is looked on as a type of retardation. However, the kind of programs required to deal with the autistic boy or girl "are much different, he explained. He said he had contacted the

Board of Education but until members can learn just how many are affected, they can do very little.

The Ontario Autistic Society has organized good programs, he said, but they're only for children of elementary school age. "After that, they go to mental institutions and vegetate," he said. He described it as "a bad situation".

Considerable progress in coping with this problem has been made in North York and the Region of Durham, Mr. Lehman said. About four children out of every 10,000 is afflicted, he

noted; some at birth and others later on.

# Driver convicted

**STOUFFVILLE** — A 17 year old Stouffville area youth, the unlicensed operator of a motor vehicle within the Bruce's Mill Conservation Area, was convicted in Newmarket Court of dangerous driving and failing to remain at the scene of an accident.

Robert Crute was charged back in June after his auto hit a cyclist, Maria Savoya, 14, of Richmond Hill and kept

on going. The girl suffered neck and back injuries.

According to evidence, Crute sent a companion back to check on the mishap, then sat in the rear of his car awaiting information. He

made no attempt to identify himself as the driver, court was told.

In finding the youth guilty on both counts, Judge V.K. McEwen described his actions as "outrageous, verging on criminal negligence."
