"The strap a last resort"

Teachers showing positive interest in school children is the best way to curtail disciplinary problems. Dr. John Denison, East Gwillimbury school trustee commented at this week's York Board of Education meeting. Tuesday.

Dr. Denison was speaking to a delegation objecting to the board's proposed policy on school discipline, and in particular the board's support of corporal punishment.

The doctor wondered if it was not the positive attention given to the child, and not the banning of the strap, that would have the most beneficial effect.

At the meeting the Board hear delegations for information purposes regarding their proposed

Eugene Page, an elementary school principal in Toronto, said that since his school has benned the strap and started using what he called "logical consequences, and couragement" of thechild, disciplinary problems have dropped tremendously.

Mal Pyper, guidance councillor. explained the system by stating that "corporal punishment only encourages more violence. If we teach the child to solve problems by strapping, then the child copies us and he solves problems with decision.

YORK REGION - violence. Strapping in no achers showing way belps the chronically misbehaving child, it just makes him worse. What he really needs is encouragement."


> She went on to explain that when a child misbehaves, "let him know what he did wrong. but also encourage that child that he still is a good person. If a child does something naughty, remove him from the class and tell him why he is being removed, but also still treat him with respect. But strapping a child doesn't work, it only begets more violence."

Georgina trustee Keith Hargrave then commented that, "I'm at a school where there is blood in the hall, where there have been stabbings, now what good does talking to a child do in a situation like that?"

Many other trustees pointed out to the delegation that they recommend corporal punishment as a last resort only, however, Mrs. Pyper reiterated her opinion that "strapping does no good at any time. It does not change a child's behaviour, in fact, it usually makes it

Both parties agreed that what is needed is more training on the part of the teachers in how to. handle discipline problems.
