Air-lift boy tohospital by helicopter

MARKHAM — A Markham boy is recovering from injuries in Toronto General Hospital after being air-lifted by helicopter from the scene of an accident Saturday afternoon.

Danny Faber, son of Bruce and Joyce Faber, 23 Captain Armstrong's Lane, was badly cut and bruised when he fell off a dune buggy driven by Bob Reesor, son of Ashmore and Marie Reesor, Tenth Line South, R.R.1, Markham. One of the machine's wheels passed over him, cutting his hip and chin and bruising his neck.

Although an ambulance was able to reach him, the operator feared the rough ride through the fields to the road might worsen his condition. He recommended a helicopter be brought in from a base station at Buttonville.

By telephone, Ashmore Reesor was able to direct the pilot to the exact spot. "By the time I had hung up, he was dropping down. He was there in a matter of minutes," he said. The injured lad was admitted, first to Sunnybrook Hospital, then transferred to Toronto General where his condition is reported as much improved.

Mr and Mrs Reesor praised the service provided by both

York Regional ambulance and the emergency helicopter, saying both had responded quickly.
