Hoover Family Reunion

Gerald Stone of Ballantrae brought a picture into The Tribune Office, last week, showing several hundred people attending a Hoover Family Reunion in the old Markham Fairgrounds. The date of the gathering is August, 1933. The information below the photo reads: "Members of the Hoover Family Association in the number of 500, attended the ninth annual reunion at the Markham Agricultural Hall. Those present came from more than thirty cities and towns in Canada, with several making the journey from points in the United States. Ex-president Herbert Hoover, whose name appears in the family tree, was unable to attend but sent greetings to his kin. In the absence of Reeve Albert Wideman, the visitors were tendered a civic welcome by Frank Nighswander and the afternoon was taken up with a miscellaneous program including addresses by several of the older members of the clan. Rev. J. W. Hoover of Dunnville was the oldest present while baby McDowell of Markham, born 27 days before, was the youngest. Omar Hoover of Ridgeway was elected president for 1934, with Alf Hoover of Markham, the vice-president and Margery Mertens of Stouffville, the secretary-treasurer. The family history goes back to Ludwig Huber, who, owing to religious persecution, left Switzerland and arrived in Philadelphia, Sept. 8, 1764. In 1804, two of his sons who belonged to the United Empire Loyalists, came to Canada and settled in Markham Township. They were followed by others who acquired land in Lincoln and Waterloo Counties". Mr. Stone's mother's sister is Gertrude (Hoover) Mathewson, a resident at Union Villa in Unionville.
