

Juveniles drop pair

The Stouffville Juveniles, despite playing some of their best hockey of the season, came up short in both matches last week.

The first loss came from the powerful Bay Ridges club, a 5-4 heartbreaker in which the Juveniles felt they should have won.

Kevin McGuckin led the Juveniles with two goals while Doug Sanders and Bill Houser popped in the other two.

After their strong effort against the Bay team, Stouffville sagged a bit in their next game against Cobourg, losing 4-2.

With their fore-checking and strong

skating absent, the Juveniles fell apart in the third period and Cobourg managed two unanswered goals for the win.

The Juveniles came back twice from one goal deficits in the first two periods, with Tom Miller scoring from the left point, Tom Lehman assisting. Steve Middleton knocked in the rebound off of Kevin McGuckin's hard shot to tie the game at two apiece but from that point it was all Cobourg.

In the third Stouffville missed several scoring chances and that, combined with ragged play in their own end, gave Cobourg the win.

Herold rounded out the scoring with assists going to Larry Fockler, Darryl Paxton and Tony Leger.

On Sunday in a return engagement with Lindsay, the Stouffville side came up with an excellent team effort and walked away with a 4-0 victory. Scott Lippett earned his first shut out of the season.

Again it was Gary Carr who provided most of the offense, scoring three goals and one assist. The other score went to Larry Fockler. Dave McKenzie with two; and Tony Herold, David Raymer and Tony Leger picked up assists.

The next Midget game is this Friday at 9 p.m. at the Arena.

Pioneers

BALLANTRAE — Nov. 24 is "Pioneer Day" for senior students of Ballantrae Public School.

The event, organized by Grade 8 History teacher, John Sandham, will include mainly the pupils of Grades 6, 7 and 8 although junior and primary boys and girls will participate in some aspects of the program.

For the Grade 8's, it's a culmination of about two months' study on the subject.

Bridges are okay

According to roads officials in Pickering, Uxbridge, Whitchurch-Stouffville, and Markham, there are no unsafe bridges in the area.

The Tribune contacted representatives of these municipalities after at least two Toronto newspapers reported there were 2,554 "structurally deficient"

rural municipal bridges in Ontario.

The report also quoted the Ministry of Transportation and Communication as saying the bridges were safe to drive on if posted load limits were respected.

The Director of Public Works for the Town of Pickering, Ray Hutchinson, said "the picture is not as bad as it is reported." He corrected the general

misunderstanding of the word "deficient," used in reference to the structures.

When bridges are classified "deficient," it doesn't mean they're crumbling away, he said. In some cases, the term means there is a chance it could be put to a use for which it wasn't designed, Mr. Hutchinson explained.

He noted these older, rural bridges weren't designed with 50 ton transport trucks in mind.

Lorne Wall, Superintendent of Roads for Uxbridge, acknowledged ordinary motorists had no worry about "deficient" viaducts. In fact, he added a bridge normally lasts many, many years after it's declared "deficient."

He pointed out that even if a trucker disobeyed the weight restrictions, the chances were slim that the unit would collapse, because

of the safety factor built into the load limit. He felt that at worst, it might crack slightly under the weight.

Stouffville's Road Superintendent, Ron Gibson, added the application of the term might also indicate the overpass needed a new paint job, or was a one lane bridge incapable of

handling future volumes of traffic.

All of the men agreed with Markham Roads Superintendent Neil Morrison, that regular inspection eliminated the hazard of collapsing bridges. None of them admitted knowledge of any overpasses in their respective townships that had given way.
