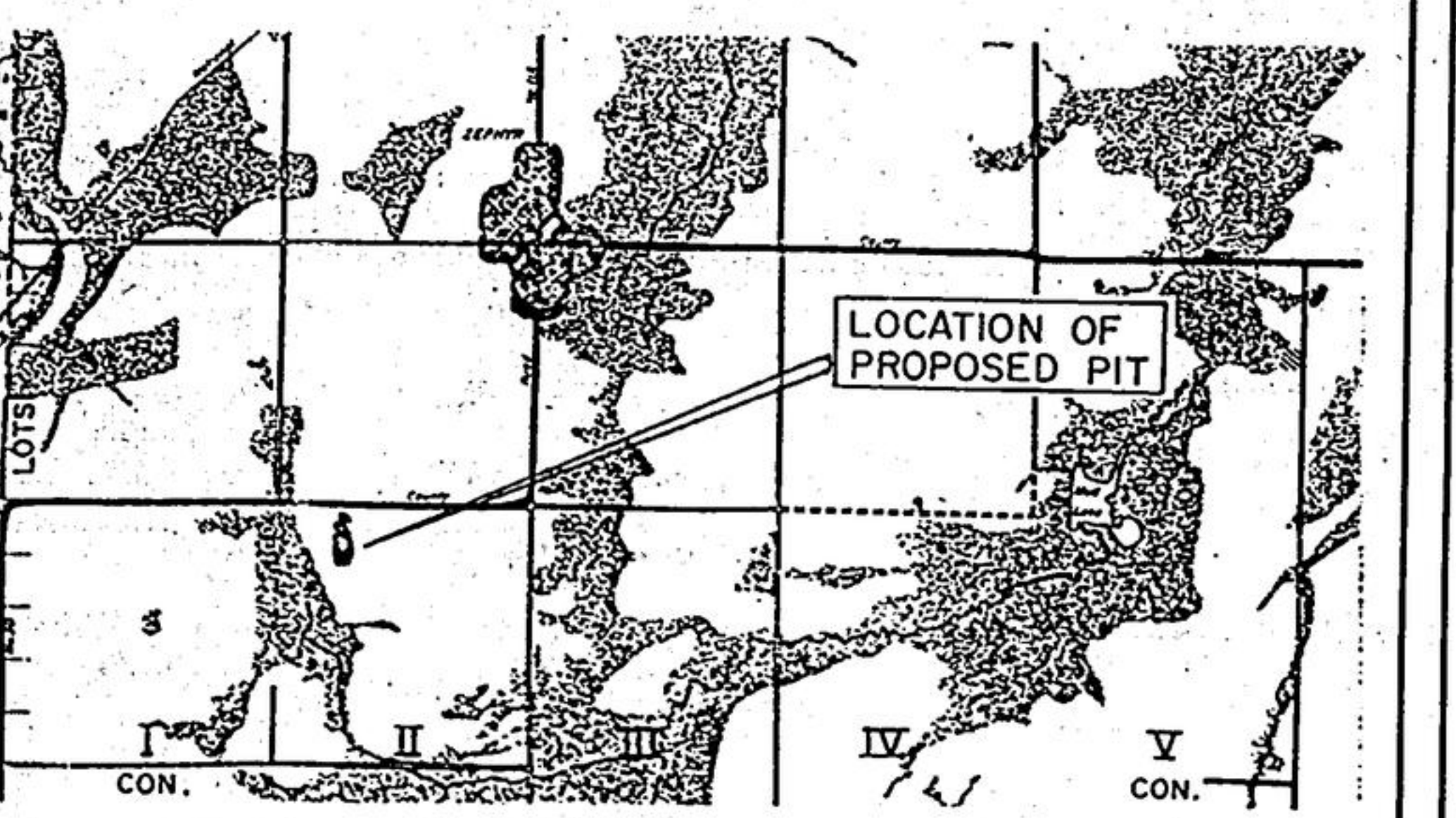

NOTICE OF PUBLIC MEETING

Take Notice that the Planning Committee of the Regional Municipality of Durham will consider a proposed amendment to the Official Plan of the Former Planning Area of the Township of Scott at a meeting to be held on January 16, 1979 at 10:00 a.m. in the Boardroom, Planning Department, 105 Consumers Drive, Whitby, Ontario. Subsequently, a recommendation of the Planning Committee will be considered by Regional Council at a meeting to be held on January 24, 1979 at 10:00 a.m. in the Council Chambers, Regional Headquarters Building, 605 Rossland Road East, Whitby, Ontario.

The purpose of the amendment application is to redesignate the land use designation contained within the Official Plan of the former Planning Area of the Township of Scott as it relates to a 15 acre parcel of land located within Part of Lot 19, Concession II, former Township of Scott, Township of Uxbridge, in order to permit the extension of a sand and gravel extractive operation subject to the issuance of a Pit and Quarry Licence.

The Public Hearing will be held by the Planning Committee of the Council of the Town of Markham to consider a Secondary Plan for the South Don Mills Industrial Planning District (Planning District No. 11).

The subject lands are located between Highway 404 on the west and Warden Avenue on the east, and between Steeles Avenue on the south and C.N.R. (Toronto By-pass) on the north. The lands consist of approximately 448 hectares (1108 acres) and are designated Industrial in the approved Official Plan of the Markham Planning Area.

The Secondary Plan has been prepared in accordance with the provisions of Section 8.2 of the Official Plan. The purpose of this Secondary Plan is to establish a detailed land use plan with a basic framework of internal roads, and to establish more detailed policies for the development of the area.
