### Fined \$50

STOUFFVILLE — A 17-year old Stouffville area youth entered a guilty plea to a charge of damaging a truck when he appeared before Judge F.D. White in Newmarket Provincial Court.

Daniel McGinty was fined \$50.

According to evidence, the accused and the truck driver became involved in an altercation on Stouffville's Main Street. McGinty took out his frustrations on the truck, kicking in the front door.

Solicitor for the teenager admitted his client had gone "a little too far," McGinty, he said, had made arrangements to cover the damage caused.

Noting that it was the lad's first conviction, Judge White agreed to a light fine. "I have a feeling you've learned something from this," he said.

## Bankrupt firms

PICKERING — Firms that suddenly leave town or go out of business without paying taxes owed the municipality, should be tracked down claim Pickering councillors Doug Dickerson and Don Kitchen.

They concluded this after it was recommended that some \$15,000 be written off the books by the treasurer.

Councillor Dickerson suggested such delinquent accounts be turned over to a collection agency.

Councillor Kitchen pointed out that one of the firms in question was still operating in Pickering but at a new location.

"If the bailiff can't find them, tell him to give me a call and I'll tell him where they are," he said.

Town manager Noel

Marshall described the bailiff's collection methods as "very thorough." "If he can't collect, nobody can," he stated.

He noted too that when a company goes into bankruptcy, the business tax is pretty low on the priority list of things that get paid off.

"Often, there are no assets to attach," he said.

## Improper records

PICKERING — A Pickering Transport owner appeared in Ajax Provincial Court recently, charged under a rarely used section of the Canada Labor Code, that of violating federal highway safety standards.

Roy Clough, conc. 4, operator of Clough Transport Ltd., pleaded guilty to three of 40 charges concerning failure to maintain

proper records for the number of highway driving hours worked by his employees.

He was fined \$500.

Federal statutes require that all hours be logged to insure the public is not endangered by tired drivers.

Federal prosecutor W.J. Manuel said that to his knowledge, there had been only one previous case in Canada.

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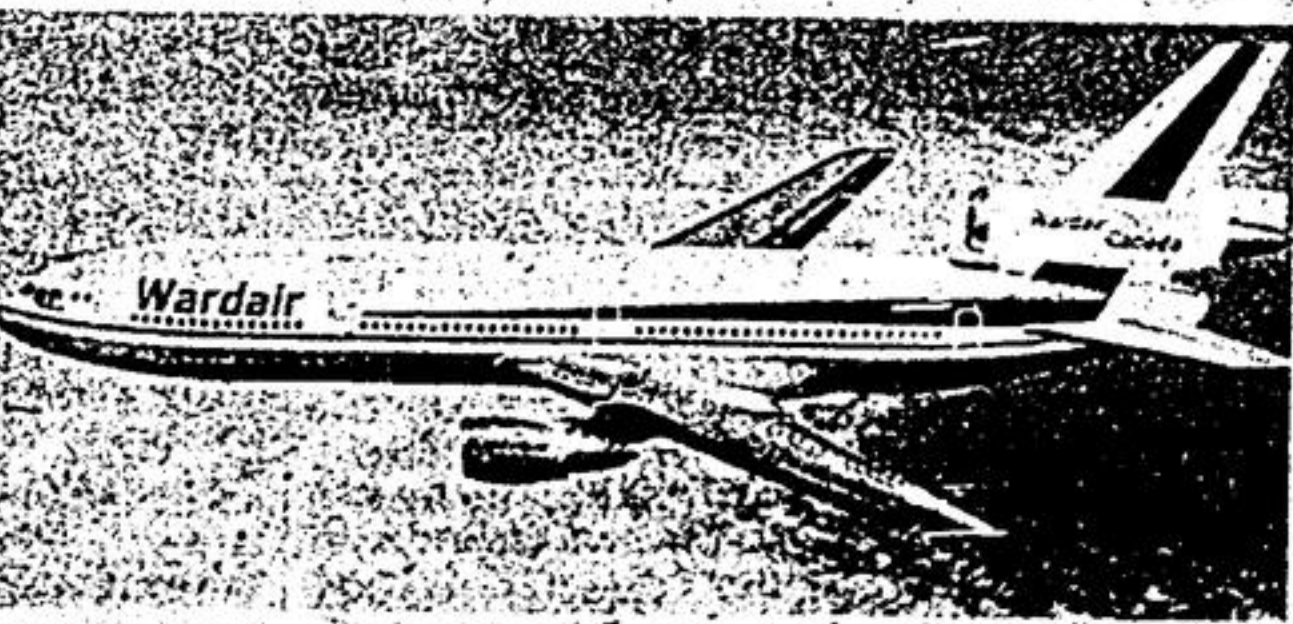
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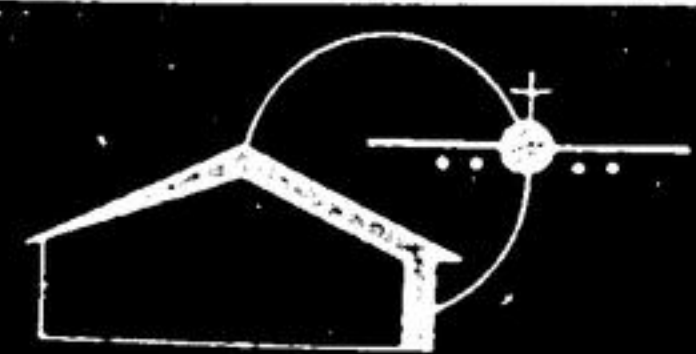
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
