Heart Fund goal-\$4,000

STOUFFVILLE — This year heart disease will cause the death of 85,000 people in Canada. February is "Heart Month." The chairperson of the Ontario Heart Foundation's Stouffville Chapter, Lovanna Sanders, is asking the community to support this campaign.

"The Heart Fund is our number one defense fund against heart disease," she says. "Most of us will be affected with some type of heart trouble."

Last year, the Stouffville Chapter raised over \$3,100. Mrs. Sanders feels the organization can do better.

Her goal this year is \$4,000. The campaign will include Stouffville, Ballantrae, Billomington, and Baker Hill.

Nationally, the organization collected almost \$10,000,000 last year. About 18 per cent was used to support education and community programs, while 70 per cent went to finance heart research.

Canadian scientists have played an important role in pioneering pacemakers, artery transplants, human heart valve replacements, and coronary care units.

During February, 115 canvassers will be knocking on doors asking for contributions. Mrs. Sanders said more canvassers are needed for the east end of the village north of Main Street.

Red roses, the Heart Foundation's symbol, will be sold at drug stores and in doctors' offices.

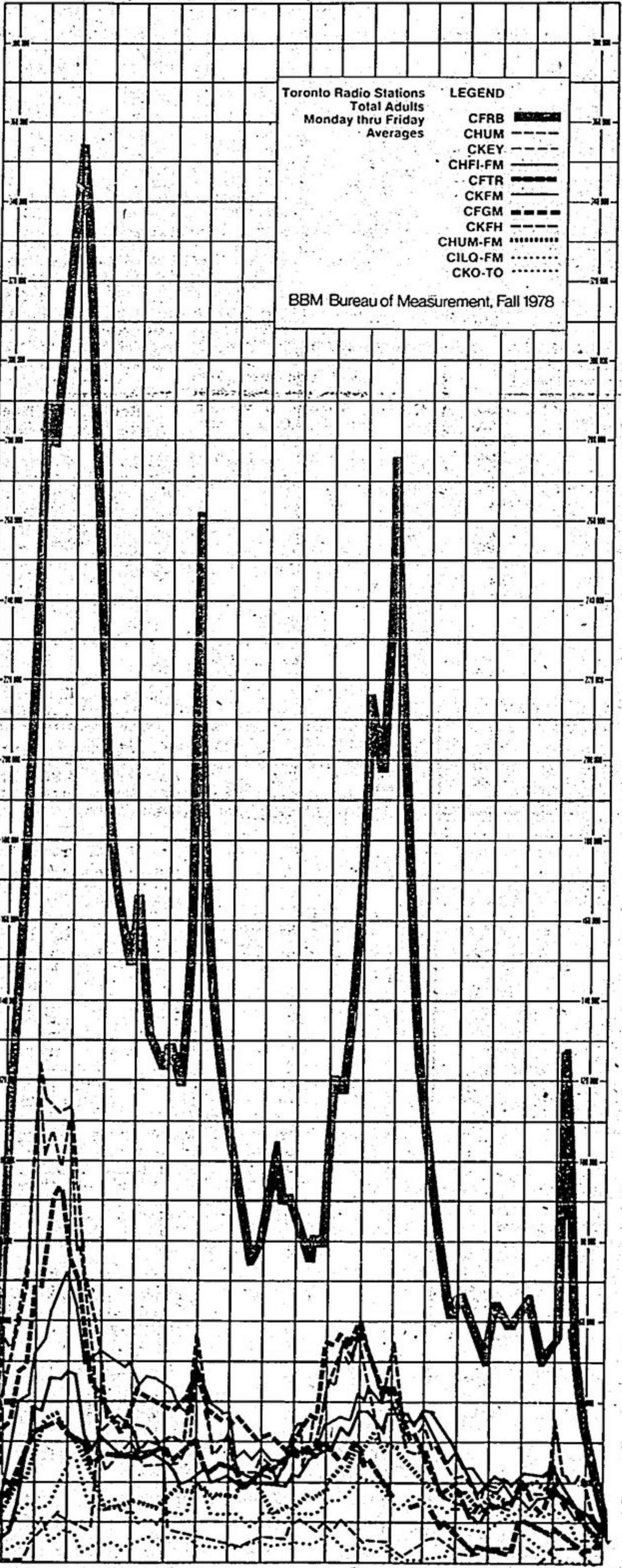
On Feb. 10 and 17 only, Brownies, Guides, and canvassers will sell "roses for research" door to door.

Mrs. Sanders, in her third year as chairperson, has also planned a poster display, and prepared information stands to be located at the Whitchurch - Stouffville Public Library, Stouffville Medical Centre and doctors' and dentists' offices.

School courses

STOUFFVILLE — Students from Grade 1 through 7 at Orchard Park School are participating in what is described as an Elective Program.

Pupils are divided into two categories, Grades 1, 2 and 3; Grades 4, 5, 6 and 7.

Courses for the younger children include carpentry, cooking, puppetry, candlemaking, crocheting and knitting, gymnastics, drawing and sketching, macrame and caring for plants and animals.

Courses for the older students include babysitting training, cooking (boys), skating, cross-country skiing, communications, copper tooling, school newspaper, quilting, drama, cooking (girls), fire prevention, crocheting and macrame, sketching, making of stuffed animals and Indian crafts, crafts.
