Factory sponsors rider

STOUFFVILLE — The reputation of Larry Van Dyke is already well known in snowmobile circles, which is quite an achievement for a young man 22 years of age.

Larry, who was the all Ontario Champion for 75, 77 and 78, he did not race in 76, recently collected two firsts a second and a fourth in the Kawartha Cup races at Peterborough. A measure of his ability is that he rides a machine of only 250 cc, whereas his wins have come in the up to 340cc class. This also reflects on the ability of his mechanics who strive hard to extract that extra one or two horse power, which can make the difference between winning and losing a race.

The week prior to the Kawartha Cup races he also collected two firsts and two seconds in the Georgian Cup series held at Owen Sound.

Having spent a year apiece with 'Mercury' and the now defunct 'Skiroule' marques he is now in his third year with 'Arctic Cat'.

According to Larry the cost of operating just one machine on the racing circuit is around \$10,000 a year. So far he has been fortunate enough to be sponsored by his father. However, it looks as if dad is 'off the hook' for next year. Due to Larry's success with the 'Cat' machines he has been offered a 'factory rider' by the manufacturers for the 79-80 season.

Working in his father's workshops at 'Bethesda Sales and

Service, who specialize in the Arctic Cat marque, Larry has had a first hand insight into the development of snowmobiles over the last seven years.

From an anti-social, noisy and unreliable piece of machinery, the industry has progressed to producing the highly sophisticated and socially acceptable machines of today, which are fast

gaining more and more public acceptance.

Although the 'new era' machines are much faster than their predecessors, they are by no means dangerous and have, as yet, not been overdeveloped to a point where they cannot be handled safely by a competent rider.

The demise of many manufacturers over the last few years; there

were over one hundred then in 1972, has been instrumental in the industry making such rapid progress in development. There are only a few manufacturers producing snowmobiles. Regarding the recent formation of a snowmobile club in the Stouffville area this feels "cannot but have salutary effect on the snowmobilers' imag

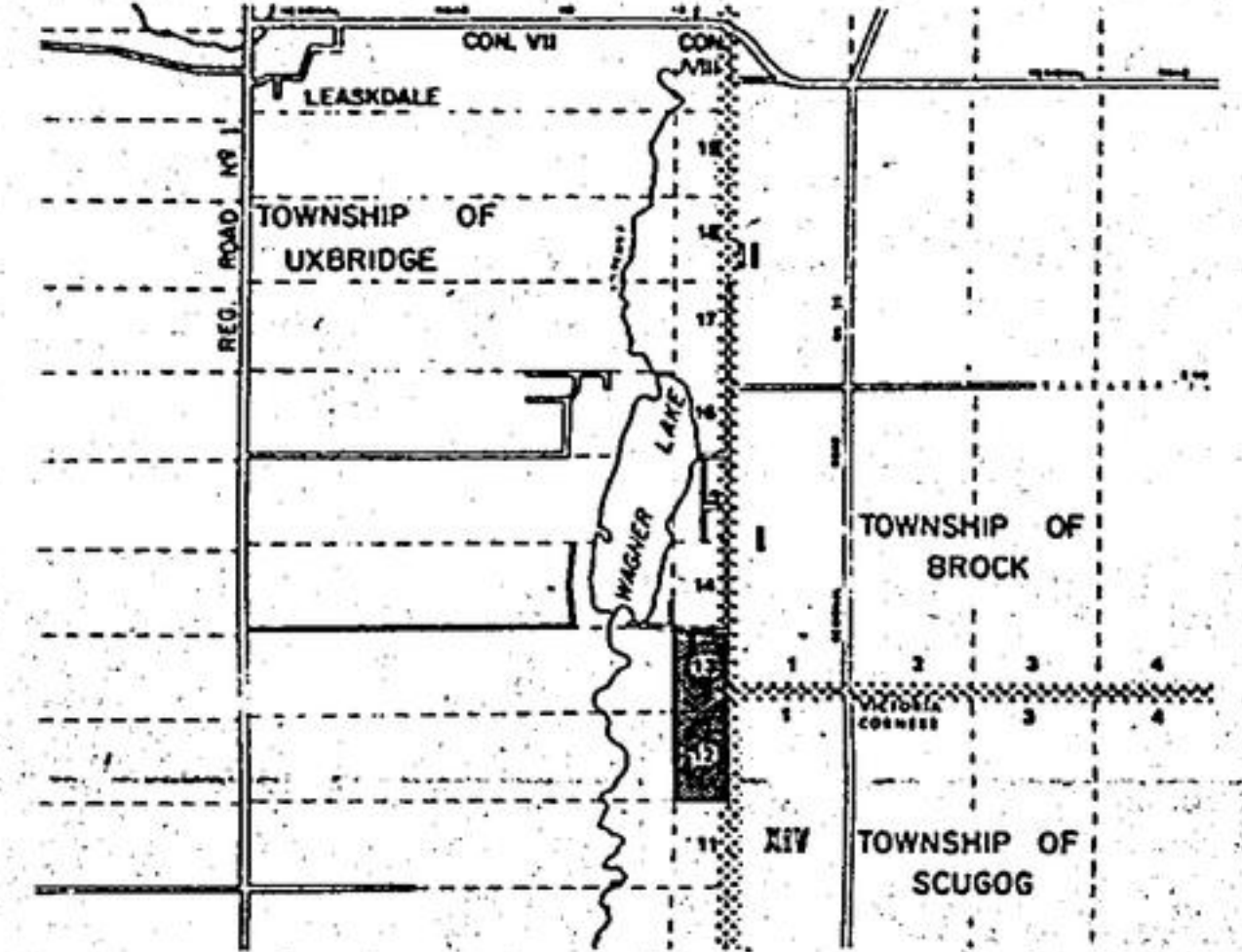
AMENDMENT TO THE DURHAM REGIONAL OFFICIAL PLAN

The purpose of the proposed amendment is to permit in the Township of Uxbridge in the location indicated on the map below an Estate Residential development to a maximum of 17 residential units.
