Unique baby book honors Variety Club

A new book for young parents, written from a baby's perspective, *Let Me Introduce My Self* has been released during this—the international year of the child.

The publishers, Girling Wade Marketing Inc., have dedicated release of the book to the "outstanding work done by the Variety Club of Ontario—Tent 28".

During the official dedication, Bill Girling of Girling Wade also presented the Variety Club's chief Barker, Reg Bovald, with a cheque for \$1,000 to provide audiovisual and reading aids for the Variety Village program for handicapped youngsters.

Let Me Introduce My Self is designed to help parents relate to their newborn children in the

first 30 months of life, according to co-author Herman Williams.

The 128-page book is the result of 35 years of research by staff of the Union College Character Research Project in New York. It is intended as a learning system in book format "which can help parents to look and observe their own child, to understand what the child is trying to say, and to record it in the diary section of the book", Williams said.

Defer plan

BLOOMINGTON — Council has deferred consideration of a new subdivision proposal by builder Michael Wade until completion of the Town's Official Plan.

Councillor Becky Wedley explained when the Official Plan is completed, Council will evaluate a number of plans, including Mr. Wade's, which are currently in limbo.

Mr. Wade's proposal calls for construction of 15 homes on two acre lots on property across from the York Sanitation landfill site.

The homes would be located on the grounds of an already approved project, "The Three Pines Golf and Country Club," providing year-round residence to some clubmembers who desire it.

Members of council offered some comments on the idea. Councillor Jim Sanders was concerned the land on which Mr. Wade wants to build is part of the en-

vironmentally sensitive Oak Ridges Moraine.

However, Mayor Eldred King said he doubts the low density of homes will have serious impact on the area. He added the Ministry of Environment has rarely supported Council in its concerns about the Moraine area.

Councillor Jim Doble said "in good conscience" he could never support development so close to the landfill site. He was concerned about the liquid waste once dumped there, observing pollution crises had erupted as long as 15 years after closure of the dump site.

STOUFFVILLE — Every year Ged Stonehouse sends over 2,000 people south across Canada and to Europe. Though Ged's advice is free, he's not a philanthropist. He's Stouffville's local travel agent.

Finding jobs scarce in social work, the subject he studied at university, he was looking for another career when he was given the opportunity to manage a travel agency.

He began in 1973, when it opened as a

branch of the Uxbridge travel agency. Three years ago, he bought out the owner and opened "Stonehouse of Travel."

Always busy preparing for other people's vacations, Ged seldom has time for a holiday himself. But he doesn't find it too frustrating because he enjoys his work.

Every so often, though, he feels the urge to "scoot away" like everyone else. During peak season, though, he just doesn't have time. The peak period for

Ged's business runs from mid Nov. to April and from May to Sept.

People are already booking ahead for their summer vacations.

Ged's explained holidays in the south have increased markedly since salaries have risen and charter fares have decreased.

Most of Ged's traveling is done "off season" with his wife, Betty, the company accountant. Even then most of their trips are business-related.

Ged and his wife or staff members take several "familiarization tours" annually. According to him, they're "a very important part of the business."

Ged's constantly taking updating courses and acquainting himself with the latest tour packages, computerized reservation systems, and farestructures. He says it takes six months to properly train an employee.
