YORK-DURHAM — Beginning April 17, the Canada Employment and Immigration Commission will operate out of an office at 713 Davis Drive in Newmarket.

The intent of the service is to eventually incorporate the Unemployment Insurance Department and the Employment Bureau into a single operation and thus reduce some of the delays presently encountered. Area Manager Hugh Shaw told The Tribune.

The district, of which Whitchurch-Stouffville is a part, extends from the Stouffville-Gormley Road on the south to Bradford on the north; Uxbridge on the east to Hwy. 50 on the west. The population is close to 120,000.

With respect to unemployment, Mr. Shaw described the situation here as "fairly good". "It's higher than we would like, but we're still one of the fortunate areas".

PLEASE NOTE:

- Parents or guardians must be public school supporters.
- To be eligible for admission in September 1979 children must have been born on or before 1974/12/31. Verification of birthdate and record of immunization are required. Application forms for birth certificates are available in the schools.
- If a school receives more registrations than it can accommodate, all registrations received before May 1st will be treated equally as far as date of registration is concerned. Registrations received on or after May 1st will be sequenced and the date of registrations will be the criteria used to determine which pupils may be required to attend another school unless there are sufficient volunteers to do so.
