Announces grant to aid children

Hon. Barney Danson has announced the awarding of a \$8,424 grant to enable the Ontario Association For Children With Learning Disabilities to develop a program within the facilities of the Glenbrook Day Camp in Markham. The project will create six new jobs for a recreational and remedial program focusing on the educatable retarded, the learning disabled, and those with social and emotional problems. Students who are considering a career in child care, recreation, or physical education would benefit greatly from the work experience, Mr. Danson said.

Jim Rehill Guest speaker

STOUFFVILLE — "The attitudes toward growing old have to change. Unless we do something with younger people and seniors alike we will have problems," geriatrics expert Jim Rehill told members of the Silver Jubilee Club. The Stouffville resident and member of the Ontario Advisory Council to Senior Citizens says the population of older people is increasing dramatically due to the number of couples refusing to have children and the fact more and more people are living longer.

Mr. Rehill says young

people must be convinced of the facts, that the elderly suffer no mental or physical disabilities which keep them from meaningful work.

In his view, the manner to accomplish this is through integration programs in the schools, where young and old associate. With them, attitudes can be changed, he explains.

Because families tend to break apart, and most people are disconnecting themselves from their parents, young children receive little contact with seniors, studies reveal. Consequently, they have little understanding of them or their situations.

Society must discover new methods of coping with the large numbers of seniors, he pointed out.

The cost of institutional care for seniors is high, while health care and pension payments place a tremendous burden on the taxpayer.

Some programs, such as "Meals on Wheels," and a telephone check service have been perfected to assist seniors to live in their own homes. Other programs have created a job pool, where residents barter their services in return for help from others their own age, he stated.
