rather one sided 5-2.

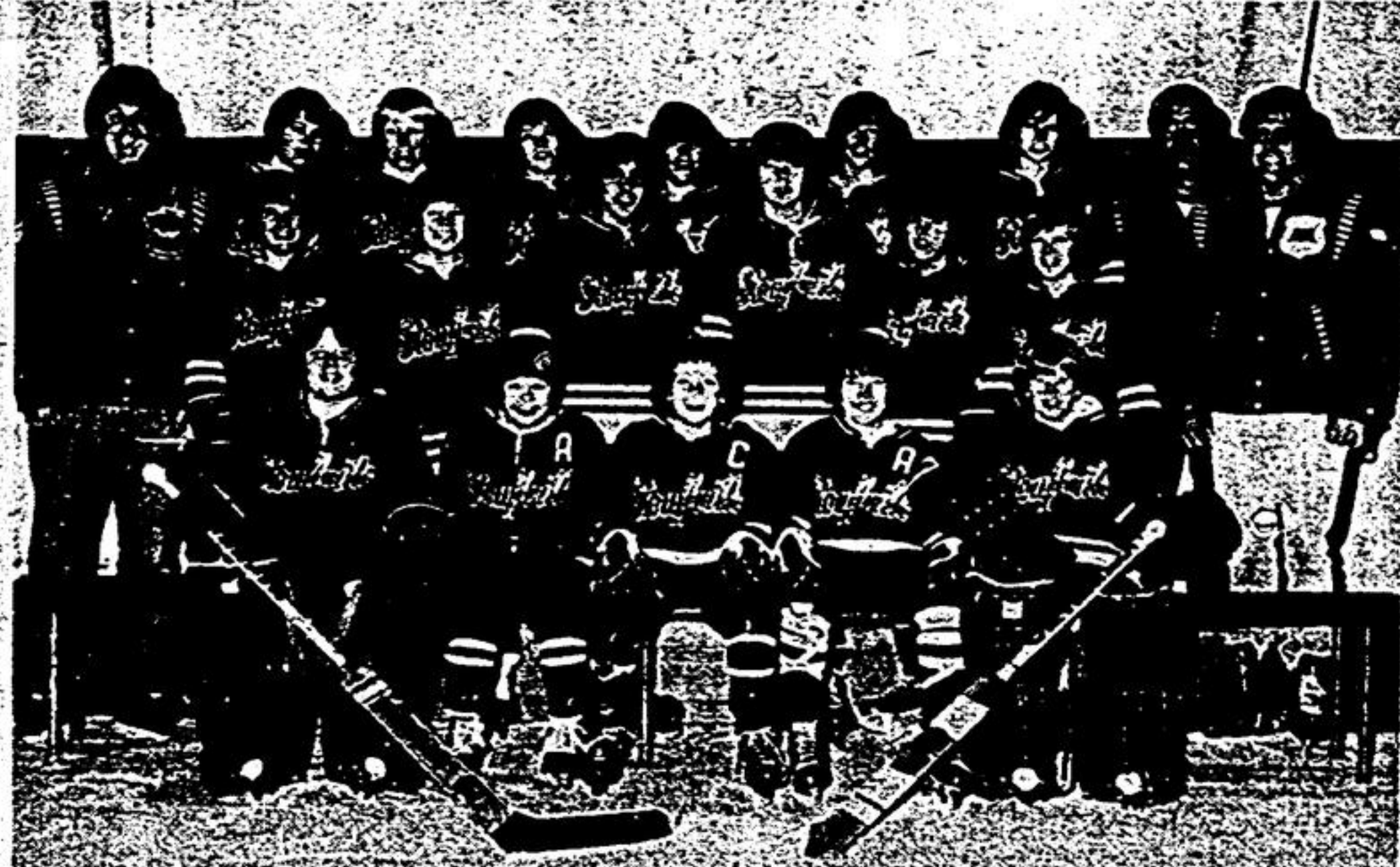

**STOUFFVILLE** — In their second exhibition game of the season, York County rugby team met a well prepared Balm Beach side in their Saturday afternoon game at The Beaches.

With Stouffville leading 3-1 Mark Murphy collected number four at the beginning of the third and everything looked rosy.

Disaster struck in the form of four goals within as many minutes.

Despite the setback, Stouffville refused to lie down and die. It was here that they showed all the characteristics that brought them to the championship final. They played brilliantly, to come back and score two more, to tie Petrolia 6-6.

With only seconds left in the game, Petrolia made a supreme effort, slipped behind the Stouffville defence and picked up the winning goal.

The final game in the series was a do or die effort for both teams. It was doubtful if Petrolia could have won another away game against a team of Stouffville's calibre.

The checking was horrendous, but clean, and being a much lighter side Stouffville were badly shaken. Barry Greenshields was injured but came back to make a valiant effort. It was, however, obvious that he was still hurting.

Stouffville's coaching staff are to be commended for bringing their team so far along, the road to the All Ontario finals.
