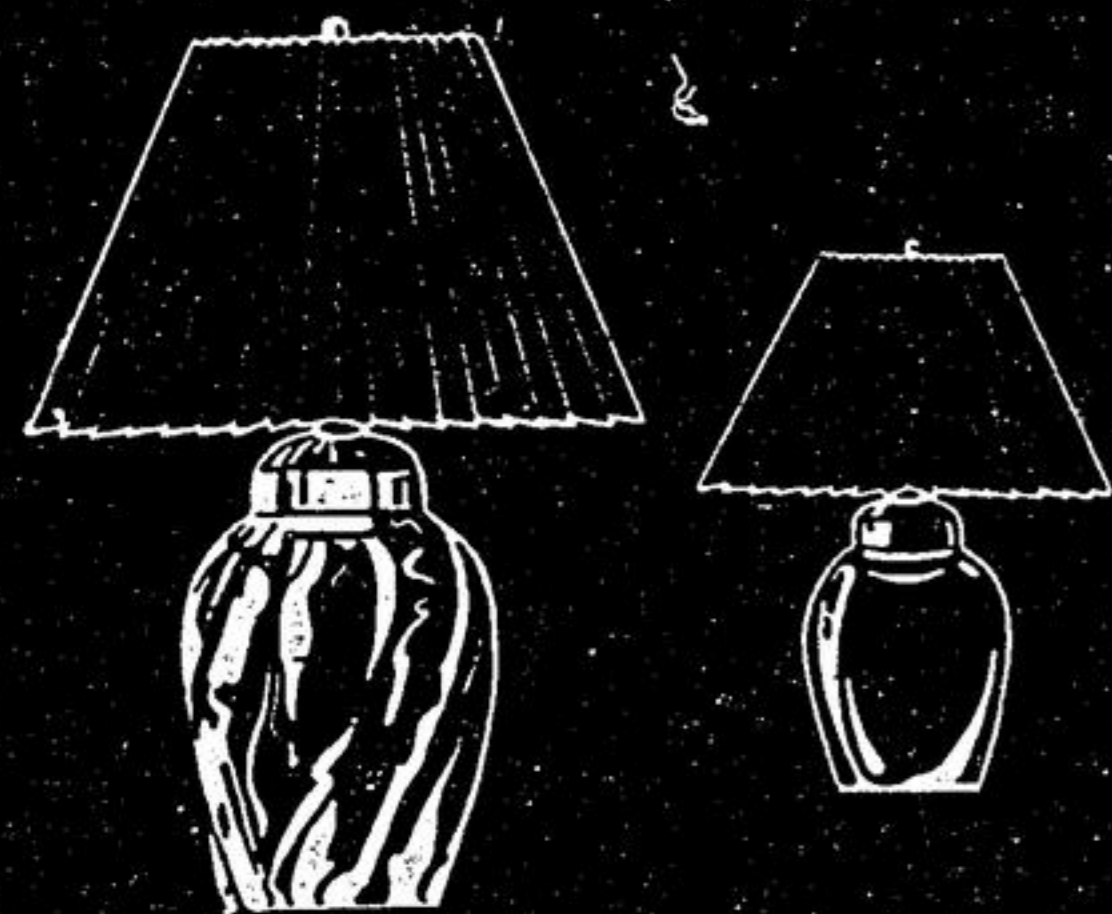

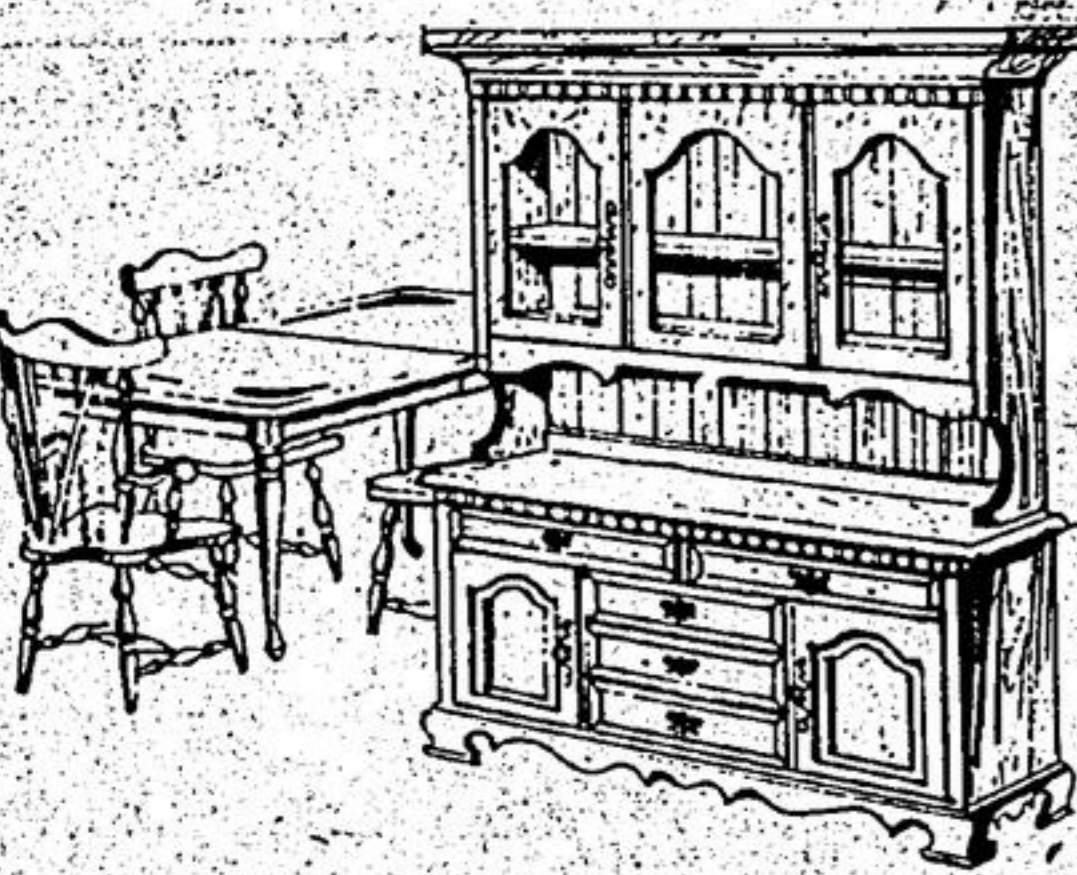

It was Bunny who, with the help of an energetic committee, designed the float for Stouffville Queen, Nancy Wideman, during Canada's centennial celebrations back in 1967.

Again, it was Bunny who lent her artistic skills to the float that carried Stouffville's own centennial queen, Michelle Morley, in 1977.

Through the years, it has seemed that flowers and Bunny, Burton were one. Think of one and one automatically thinks of the other.

It is with this background of experience that she, with the help of her husband, Bruce, has opened up a new flower shop in Stouffville. The location is immediately east of the town Bowling Centre on the north side of Main Street.

Bunny Burton has been a resident of Lemonsville on the 7th concession of Whitchurch-Stouffville for the past sixteen years. She already has a flower shop in Richmond Hill but she admits it's always been a secret ambition to

operate something similar in Stouffville. That wish has now come true.

If operating two stores isn't enough, she also has other interests. She sponsors a girls' hockey team; she's the director of the Toronto Chapter of Flowers Canada; she's active in the congregation of Lemonsville United Church and in 1977, was selected over five men to conduct classes at the University of Guelph.

Yes, she has help. In addition to her husband, daughter, Gayle, is interested in this type of work. Gayle manages the Richmond Hill Store and recently won the Canada Flowers Design Award plus a coveted prize in a provincial competition for a best Mother's Day Arrangement.

Floral interest within the Burton family stops there, however, Bunny admits. Son Jeffrey's a machinist and son Chris is employed with a firm that installs aluminum siding.

However, the husband-wife, mother-daughter arrangement is working well and, who knows, says Bunny, the two boys could still grow 'green thumbs' too.
