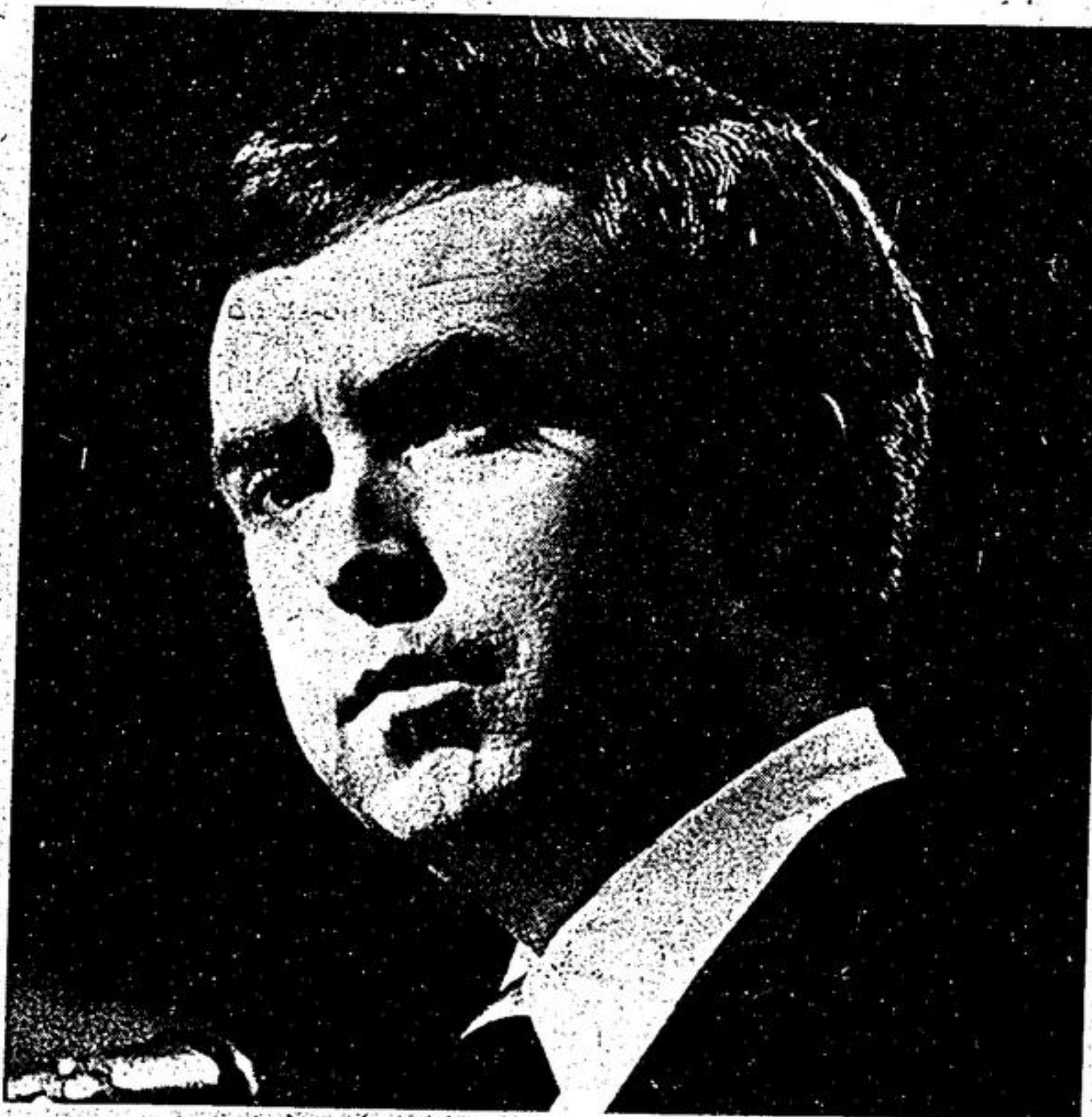


A well balanced gal
